### Hartwell Is Held On Driving Charge

### Woodburn Coroner's Jury Holds Accident Due to Passing in Fog

The Marion county grand jury probably will be asked to investigate the traffic accident Saturday morning in which Mrs. F. A. Mignot of Woodburn lost her life, Deputy District Attorney Joseph Felton indicated yesterday.

Meantime, following a coroner's inquest at Woodburn, George Hartwell of Hoquiam, Wash., driver of the truck that collided with the Mignot automobile, is being held on a reckless driving charge filed by F. A. Mignot, widower.

WOODBURN—A coroner's jury sitting in the inquest to determine cause of death of Mrs. Bertha Mignot, who died Saturday morning following an automobile accident, found death was due to the negligent driving of George Hartwell, Hoquiam, Wash., who

the jury's verdict said passed another vehicle in the fog and without clear visibility.

Hartwell was present at the inquest, held at the Beechler and O'Hair mortuary, but did not testify. The jurors were Alfred Klampe, W. H. Broyles, J. J. Hall, John Becker, Winton J. Hunt and Robert H. Scott.

Testifying at the inquest were: F. A. Mignot, widower of the crash victim, Dr. Gerald B. Smith, Keith O'Hair, State Police Sergeant Farley Mogan, P. E. Morgan, Floyd Maricle, H. K. Sargeant, Alice Sargeant, Frank Grims, Lester Smith, F. A. Baker, Mrs. Lila Farley and Henry Kunz, driver of the Silver Wheel truck also in the accident.

Deputy District Attorney Joseph Felton handled the case for the state, with County Coroner L. E. Barrick in charge.
