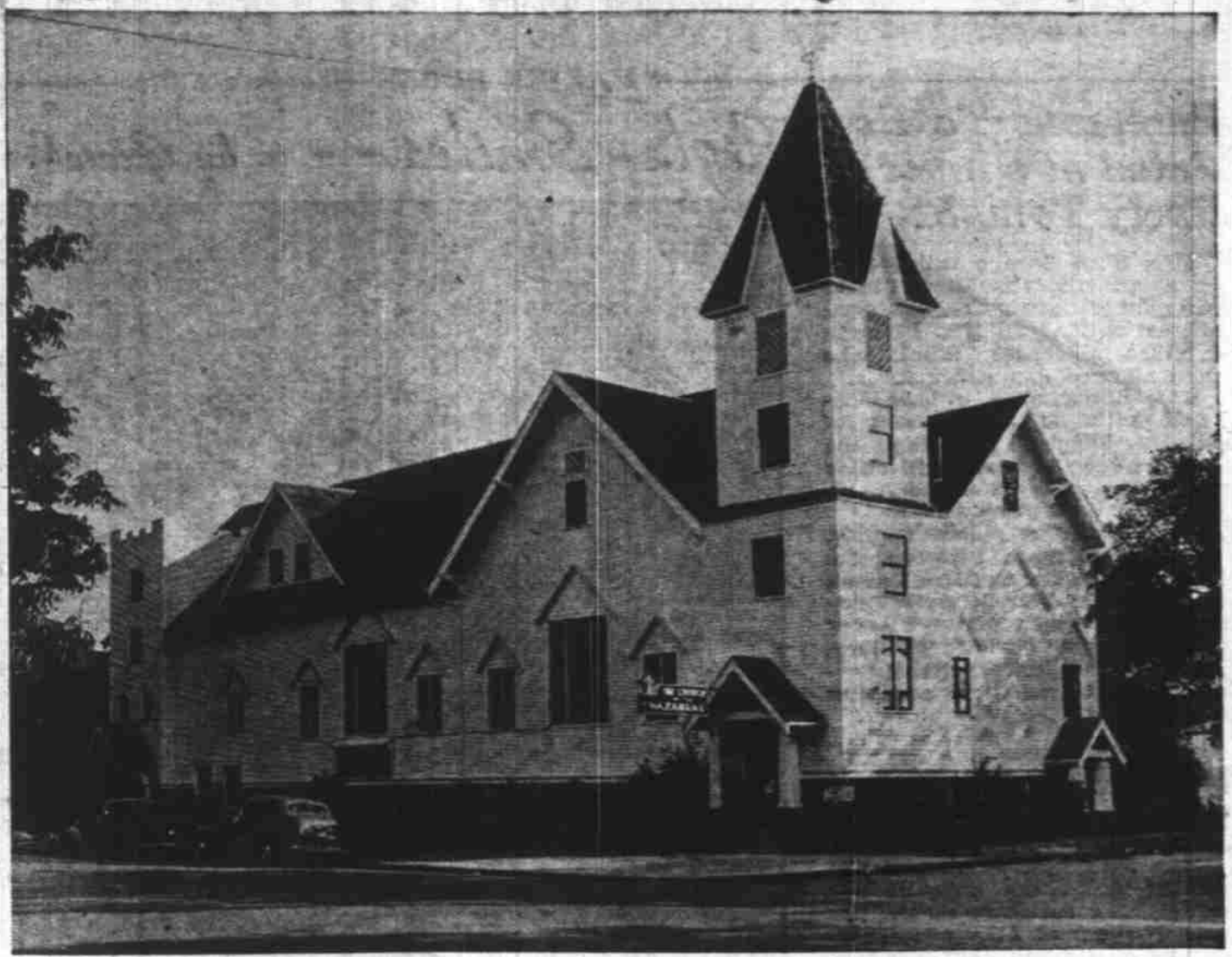

Nazarene Church Has New Pews, Carpets, Numerous new Improvements

With remodeling of the Church of the Nazarene, 13th and Center streets, fast nearing completion, the church congregation is making preparations for formal opening and dedication of the new building on Sunday, October 9, announces Rev. Leo W. Collar, pastor.

Finishing touches now in progress include installation of beautiful new pews and laying of carpets.

Auditorium Capacity 900
The auditorium will comfortably seat 900 people. The modern acoustical arrangements make the auditorium outstanding. The rostrum that seats 125 choir members and the painted picture immediately back of the baptistry, is pleasing to the eye.

A new venture in church planning is the mothers and class room. This room is directly behind the balcony and has two large plate glass windows across the side of the room that faces the auditorium. A loud speaker is installed in the room and with the public address system, it enables the mothers to hear and hear everything that is taking place in the public service. The room is equipped with couches, davenport, rocking chairs and a rest room.

The Sunday school is equipped with five large assembly rooms for departments and 32 classrooms that are to house their fast growing school that now numbers 532 with their goal set for 1000. The church has had a new coat of paint and with the neon sign it is unusually attractive.

The reconstruction and enlargement program has been inspired by Rev. Collar who came here two and a half years ago from Spokane and who has in that time brought a remarkable growth in the church membership. Officers and leaders in the church departments who have assisted him are:
