Churchill asserted Britain should have joined with others to prevent German encroachment on Czechoslovakia saying that "a combination of France and Britain, maintaining contact with Russia, would have given strength to those forces in Germany which resisted Hitler's new design."

"Can you blind yourself to the great change? . . . I foresee and foretell that a policy of submission will carry with it restrictions on freedom of speech in parliament, on the public platform and in the press."

"We have sustained a defeat without war and the whole equilibrium of Europe has been changed."

Simon gave commonsense the government's contrasting view of the issue declaring Czechoslovakia had been created "in defiance of the principle of self-determination."

"The reason given by the county court for the proposed tax levy is as follows:

D. F. Burge Dies, Services Friday

Well-Known Breeder of Horses Was Resident of Albany Area

ALBANY—Funeral services for D. F. Burge, 67, who died at the Emanuel hospital, Portland, Tuesday morning following an attack of pneumonia, will be held from the Fisher Funeral Home Friday morning at 10 o'clock. Burial will be in Willamette Memorial Park.

D. F. Burge was probably the best known breeder of Percheron horses in the northwest. In 1906 he bought his first mares, paying \$2200 for them, and since then had exhibited almost continuously. His matched six-horse team of Percherons, were a feature not only of the Oregon state fair but of other state fairs of the northwest as well as of the Pacific International Livestock exposition.

Mr. Burge was taken ill with a cold following his return to Portland last week from Washington where he had been exhibiting 15 head of horses, presumably as the result of exposure while taking care of an ailing horse enroute. After reaching Portland, he became worse and was taken to the hospital.

D. F. Burge was born May 20, 1871 in Iowa. The family came to Oregon in 1880, first settling near Salem, and later moving to near Albany, where Mr. Burge had since made his home.

Surviving are the widow, Mrs. Rose Burge, and one brother, Maxwell Burge of Tonasket, Wash.

Manila Missed by Typhoon; 3 Killed

MANILA, Oct. 6.—(Thursday)—(P)—A typhoon which swept practically the whole length of the Philippine archipelago, leaving three known dead and much property damage in its wake, passed into the China sea today from La Union province, northwest of Manila.

Known dead were the captain of an inter-island motor boat caught in the typhoon off southern Cebu island, a woman killed by a falling coconut tree in northern Cebu island, and an aged man whose home was carried away by flood in northern Luzon island. Torrential rains caused heavy damage to public works, communications and crops in twenty provinces.

Manila, experiencing brisk winds and heavy rainfall, felt the edge of the storm.

Fehl Damage Suit Facts Not Enough

MEDFORD, Oct. 5—(P)—Judge H. D. Norton ruled yesterday Earl Fehl's \$200,000 damage suit against Jackson county officials failed to present sufficient facts to constitute cause for action.

Fehl, former Jackson county judge, asserted County Clerk George R. Carter, Assistant District Attorney Neilson and George Coddling, former prosecutor, plotted to remove him from office, send him to prison and ruin his family.

3253 Students New High For Oregon University

EUGENE, Oct. 5—(P)—The University of Oregon reached an all time high enrollment today with registration of 3253 students. The figure represents a 6 1/2 per cent increase since the 1937 record. The largest gain was 36 per cent in the graduate school.

Mrs. Gertrude Binney Kay had told an Emerson college class in social usages that dunking is "all right at an informal house party or a little snack after the theatre." Mrs. Post laughed and agreed.

"Any place that would have doughnuts would be like a picnic where you could do pretty much as you pleased," Mrs. Post said.

Mrs. Kay added that dunking was never correct "unless you hold the doughnut between the thumb and third finger of your right hand."

Mrs. Post opined, however, "it doesn't matter much how you hold it. If you are going to dunk, you are going to dunk. But do it not too far and spread it not too wide."

ANDERSON, Ind., Oct. 5—(P)—J. G. Stafford, a wandering steplejack, was on a sidewalk strike against Madison county commissioners on a flagpole on top of the courthouse here tonight, 250 feet above the street.

Lula Belle Given 60-Day Sentence; Men Still Sought

LEXINGTON, N.C., Oct. 5—(P)—Lula Belle Kimmel, 22-year-old daughter of a jailer, pleaded guilty tonight to charges that she helped two prisoners gain their freedom and County Judge D. L. Pickard sentenced her to 60 days in jail. She confessed that she gave him the keys with which he released James Godwin, 19, and freed Bill Wilson, 21.

Shortly after Godwin, charged with first degree burglary, punishable by death in North Carolina, and Wilson, charged with a holdup, left the Davidson county jail, police began receiving reports of holdups. One man, Donald Moss of High Point, was fatally shot as he stepped from his car. Godwin and Wilson were charged with the crimes.

Search for the pair centered tonight in the vicinity of Hickory.

Barcelona Government Is Opposed to Dividing Nation, Revealed

The Spanish government, which rejected it, government spokesmen here disclosed today.

They asserted the plan, its origin obscure, would form part of international discussions aimed at ending the Spanish war as part of a general European settlement.

It was hinted "certain powers" brought up the Spanish partition scheme at the Munich parley September 30 which arranged for giving Germany slices of Czechoslovakia, Europe's other major trouble zone.

In Rome the British ambassador, Lord Perth, and Foreign Minister Count Galeazzo Ciano have been holding a series of conferences aimed at putting the Anglo-Italian eastern friendship pact into effect.

Spanish government sources here said the partition proposal ran into a stumbling block when it came to the attention of the Barcelona government.

Premier Juan Negrin speaking in the cortes (parliament) indicated he opposed such a division of the nation, and the Barcelona newspaper La Vanguardia, a supporter of the premier, said yesterday Spaniards on both sides would unite if necessary to resist any outside attempt to break up Spain.

Benes Resigns as Czechs' President

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to the nation over the radio by General J. A. Syrovky, Prague's one-eyed premier.

Benes' letter said the government, whose formation he announced only last night, "will be a government of calm, of order, of economic efforts and of social reconstruction—a government which will aim chiefly at internal development and I am convinced it will succeed in its efforts."

Syrovky made a radio appeal asking the nation to remain calm. The Czechoslovak constitution provides for no acting president, but both houses of parliament will be called within a fortnight to elect a successor to Benes.

City Is Sued for Car's Impounding

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 5—(P)—Dorothy K. West filed suit today against the city, police department and a towing service for \$8215 damages.

She asserted her car was impounded after an officer told her she could park all day—but worst of all her false teeth and other personal effects, without which she declared her health suffered, were in the automobile.

Farley Won't Aid Liberals of GOP

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5—(P)—Democratic Chairman James A. Farley spurned today the idea of supporting any liberal republicans or other non-democrats in this fall's campaign.

The democratic national committee, he emphasized to reporters, would go down the line for democrats.

This recalled that President Roosevelt made known several weeks ago that he would have no objection to election of a good liberal running on a republican ticket.

When Farley was asked whether he thought that Mr. Roosevelt might "work at cross purposes" with the democratic committee, he replied: "I don't think so."

Christianity Loss Denied by Bishop

People "Turning Dials to God," Says Dagwell at Parish Dinner

People today are "turning dials to God if not turning their faces to church," Bishop Benjamin D. Dagwell told 200 persons gathered at a St. Paul's Episcopal parish dinner Wednesday night.

The bishop's assertion was based upon his belief that the religious programs on the radio today are evidence that the spirit of religion is alive in the world.

He recalled a recent survey in which 9500 persons were questioned as to whether the church is gaining or losing ground with 50 per cent of those queried holding the church is losing ground, 24 per cent indicating a gain and 25 per cent saying they didn't know.

Spirit Said Gaining

Bishop Dagwell joined with the 24 per cent in his declaration that "the invisible church that we speak of as the holy catholic church is growing; the spirit of Christ is gaining ground."

He also spoke on church budget matters and pointed out that the church was one of the first institutions to feel the depression and one of the last to feel the improvement in business conditions.

Franciscovich Is Yugoslavia Envoy

ASTORIA, Ore., Oct. 5—(P)—Frank M. Franciscovich, president of the state senate, was named honorary consul for Yugoslavia in a commission signed today by President Roosevelt.

Franciscovich, born in America, is of Croatian blood. He was named Oregon and Washington representative for Yugoslavia upon recommendation of the Yugoslavian government and confirmed by Oregon's congressional delegation.
