

Czechs May Settle Without Plebiscite

Mixed Peoples Question Next

Germans Already Control 5000 Square Miles of Sudetenland

BERLIN, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Both German and Czech sources indicated tonight that the question of the mixed areas is the next to be solved in the progressive realization of the terms of the four-power Munich accord.

That accord marked out four zones in Czechoslovakia to be occupied by tomorrow by German troops, and the last of the zones was in process of occupation today.

It also empowered the international commission now functioning in Berlin to determine the remaining territory of predominantly German character to be occupied by German soldiers by next Monday.

5000 Miles for Reich
The commission defined this area last night and it was estimated that it and the four zones granted at Munich would give Germany approximately 5000 square miles.

The next step for the international commission under the Munich accord would be to determine territories which would vote in a plebiscite for union with Germany or for staying with Czechoslovakia.

But no favorably have negotiations progressed since yesterday's resignation of Eduard Benes as president of Czechoslovakia that prospects brightened every hour for settling the question of the mixed areas without the necessity of a plebiscite.

No Threat Made
It was stated emphatically that no threat of any kind had been issued on the part of Germany to compel action by the commission favorable to her.

The commission, it was said, was proceeding on the basis of the Munich agreement and Germany had done nothing to exceed what was conceded there. On the contrary, one Nazi spokesman said, "We would be fools to disturb an all around European understanding now in the process of making by haggling over this or that village or this or that rural district."

Bond Is Admitted In Poole's Appeal

The state supreme court Wednesday heard arguments of attorneys on the application of Harry W. Poole, Klamath Falls theatre owner, for temporary bail pending disposition of his appeal.

Poole was convicted in the Klamath county circuit court on a statutory charge and was sentenced to serve eight years in the state penitentiary. Attorneys for Poole asked that his bail be continued but this was refused.

Chief Justice Bean, after conferring with other members of the supreme court, issued an order admitting Poole to bail until such time as his appeal is disposed of. The sheriff of Klamath county was notified of the court's action. Poole's attorneys furnished a bond in the amount of \$5000.

Pilot Rock Route Change Authorized

The state highway commission Wednesday adopted a resolution rerouting a part of the Oregon-Washington highway through Pilot Rock.

The relocation of the highway through Pilot Rock will eliminate two right angle curves and the improvement will cost approximately \$25,000.

The commission declined to reroute The Dalles-California highway through Klamath Falls. It had been proposed to change this highway from Ninth to Eleventh street but a large number of protests were received. Hearings on both projects were held last month.

State May Limit Hunting, Opinion

The state has the right, under its police powers, to prohibit hunting in designated areas for the purpose of protecting, preserving and propagation of fish and game, regardless of whether or not such areas consist of both public and privately owned lands, Attorney General Van Winkle held Thursday. The opinion was requested by District Attorney J. S. Cook of Harney county.

China Admits Kichun Taken

Japanese Column Within 14 Miles of Hankow Railway Line

HANKOW, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Chinese military headquarters acknowledged tonight that Japanese forces had occupied Kichun, on the north bank of the Yangtze river, 30 miles downstream from Hankow.

Simultaneously Chinese military authorities admitted that a Japanese column pressing westward through the southern tip of Homan province, had reached a position within 14 miles of the Peiping-Hankow railway. The Chinese said their "re-primed" airforce bombed and machine-gunned the Japanese in the river valley above Kichun while Japanese airmen bombed Manchang, south of Kichun, and Chengchow, junction of the Lung-hai and Peiping-Hankow railways in northern Homan.

A railway station at Chengchow was said to have been destroyed. Japanese occupation of Wutai, a city of northern Shanxi province, stronghold of the Chinese eighth army, was reported semi-officially. Wutai, about 200 miles southwest of Peiping, is famous as a religious center.

Since the Chinese-Japanese war started, Wutai has been known as capital of "the Chinese border government" from which the eighth army, a communist force, directed anti-Japanese political and military activity throughout north China.

Double Shift for Shelton Dam Job

The WPA will work a double monthly shift on the Shelton ditch control dam project in an effort to complete the work before flood conditions occur, G. R. Boatwright, district engineer, announced yesterday. The present crew of 15 men will be stepped up to 40 or 50 in the near future.

R. D. Cooper, engineer who superintended first work on the Shelton ditch flood control project under the SEFA five years ago, has been placed in charge of the dam construction job at the request of the state and county engineers. Boatwright said. The dam will consist of two units, one across the ditch and the other across Mill creek, both located a short distance southeast of the penitentiary. It will replace temporary structures that flood water of the last five years have virtually destroyed.

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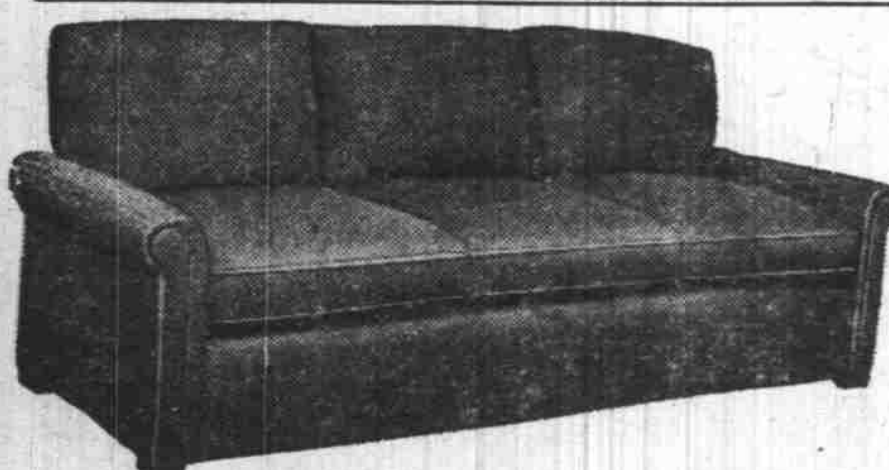
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
