

Slovaks Hail New Liberty

People Counseled Against Disorders in Taking Autonomy

ZILANA, Czechoslovakia, Oct. 7. (AP)—Slovak patriots, jubilant over newly won autonomy within the framework of the Czechoslovak republic, were counseled today to refrain from any disorder which might offer the pretext for foreign intervention.

A former member of parliament, Fedor Ruppeldt, prepared a proclamation for issuance by civil authorities, urging the people to accept the autonomy victory in calmness.

Zilana, stronghold of the Slovak people's party, became quiet after night-long celebration of Slovakia's new status and appointment of Dr. Joseph Tiso, 51, vigorous Roman Catholic priest, as prime minister of Slovakia.

Before he left for Prague with eight other representatives of the Slovak people's party to discuss Slovakia's future under home rule, Dr. Tiso said Slovakia would accept social justice to all parties and, above all, work to maintain its territorial integrity.

He said he wanted Slovaks in America to know that "our first thought" was of them "to whom we are grateful for moral and financial support." He added:

"I wish it were possible that all Slovaks might come back and live with their brethren."

He pounded the speaker's table vigorously and shouted, "We Slovaks will be able to lead the foreign policy of fighting against communism."

Travel Car Asked By Realty Board

The State Association of Realty Boards, meeting in Portland today, will be asked to consider a resolution adopted by the Salem Realty board yesterday calling on the state highway department advertising division to maintain a travel car to attract tourists to Oregon. The car would carry colored motion pictures of the state's attractions and exhibit them throughout the nation.

The board referred to its municipal affairs committee the question of whether or not it should support the proposal to donate \$50,000 in bonds for construction of a municipal stadium. Fear was expressed the stadium measure would interfere with the movement to obtain a new court-house.

Discussion indicated an investigation might be made of the manner in which city-owned lots are being disposed of.

Mexican Predicts Land Settlement

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 7. (AP)—Dr. Francisco Castillo Najera, Mexican ambassador to Washington, today predicted settlement "within a very few days" of the issue between Mexico and the United States over expropriation of American-owned lands.

"The countries are very near accord," he said between conferences with President Laroza Cardeenas and other government officials.

"I am unable to discuss details because they are yet to be arranged. But you can say that a settlement will be reached within a very few days."

Secretary Hull has sent Mexico two sharp notes on behalf of the Washington government demanding payment for the expropriated properties and that further seizures be halted without proper compensation.

30-Year-Olds Will Cast First Ballot

As the deadline on voters' registrations loomed, Cecil Edwards, manager of the Marion-Polk county Sprague-for-Governor headquarters, revealed that campaign workers took two Salem women, octogenarians, to the office of County Clerk U. G. Boyer to register.

"I've never registered before," Edwards quoted both of them as saying. One, he said, declared she was registering as a "democrat, old-fashioned," and the other said she was going down as an independent.

"But they both said they were voting for Charles A. Sprague, republican," Edwards wound up.

Arabs on Strike Against Mandate

LONDON, Oct. 7. (AP)—Arab workers in Haifa struck today in protest against the British mandate rule of the Holy Land while in London Colonial Secretary Malcolm MacDonald sought some scheme to end Palestine's guerrilla civil warfare.

At the same time the Moslem congress assembled in Cairo to devise its own plans. Delegates from French and Spanish Morocco, Syria, Lebanon, Palestine, India, Yugoslavia and Yemen were in attendance.

There were no representatives, however, from Saudi Arabia, Transjordan, Sudan, Iran, Turkey or Afghanistan.

MacDonald canvassed all shades of opinion in London and conferred with Sir Harold MacMichael, high commissioner for Palestine, on ways to quell the revolt.

Last Rites Today For Philip Gilbert

Funeral services for Philip Gilbert, 77, will be held today from the Clough-Barrick chapel at 2 p.m., with Dr. Henry Marcotte of Portland officiating. Mr. Gilbert died yesterday morning after several weeks illness at a local hospital.

Mr. Gilbert came to Salem in 1911 from St. Paul, Minn., and established himself in law practice with the late A. O. Condit. He later returned to St. Paul and came back here in March, 1937. Altogether he practiced in St. Paul for over 50 years. He also had farming interests around Salem.

He was born October 23, 1860, in Coldwater, Mich., and on June 1, 1889 was married to Alecia Tinkham, who survives him as does a son, Tinkham Gilbert of Salem, two other sons, three daughters and a brother.

Dr. F. Don Baylor Dies in Portland

Francis Don Baylor, 40, former Salem doctor, died in the veterans' hospital in Portland Monday morning, with burial held Wednesday afternoon in the veterans' plot in Lincoln Memorial cemetery, Portland.

Dr. Baylor came to Salem from Des Moines, Iowa, about 10 years ago and carried on an active practice here until last year. He had been in the veterans' hospital about a month but had been ill for several months. He was born in Illinois.

Surviving him are two sons living in Marshfield and his father in Los Angeles, all present at the final services.

McKee Is Warned On Marble Board

Marshall McKee, arrested recently for operating three payoff marble boards at Playmore park north of Woodburn, was warned yesterday by District Attorney Lyle J. Page to refrain from running them in the future if he did not desire to be arrested again. McKee pleaded guilty and paid a \$25 fine for violation of the state anti-slot machine statute.

Review Writs Granted Firm

Judgments Held Entered in Less Than Time Law Allows

Writs of review of two Salem justice court judgments were granted the Howard-Cooper corporation yesterday by Circuit Judge L. H. McMahon. Transcripts from the lower court were ordered filed by October 20.

The corporation alleged in petitions for the writs that default judgments in favor of D. E. McNerney in one case and Ed Harmon and Horton Houck in the other were entered in less than the time allowed by statute for answers to be filed.

Circuit Court—William J. Tompkins vs. Josephine Gardner, Tompkins' complaint for divorce; cruel and inhuman treatment alleged; married July 19, 1937.

L. F. Newman vs. Walter Zosel, et al; memorandum opinion by Circuit Judge Lewelling ruling that a decree of dismissal of suit for personal judgment against Zosel must be entered; Newman, says the opinion, attempted to file a lien on certain property by virtue of his having been employed by one Huggard who built a service station for Zosel but the lien was void; only the property and not the owner may be subjected to a mechanic's lien, the court ruled.

A. E. Torgeson vs. D. C. Terhune, orders of dismissal and release of attachment of 30 bales of hops and unbaled hops, based on voluntary non-suit resulting from compromise settlement.

Brakeman Winner In Damage Case

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 7. (AP)—A \$20,000 damage judgment for C. W. Hosman, Southern Pacific brakeman whose back was broken when he was thrown from a freight car in 1924, was upheld today by the state district court of appeal.

A jury awarded the judgment here after testimony that freight car brakes had operated in faulty manner, causing two cars to collide and hurling Hosman to the ground. The accident occurred at Eugene, Ore., in December, 1924.

The Southern Pacific company still has a possible appeal to the California supreme court from the judgment.

Shull Is Champion At Prize Winning

CHICAGO, Oct. 7. (AP)—If they ever post a prize for a new I'm working-my-way-through-college scheme, it probably will be won by Henry Shull.

Shull, a junior, is paying his expenses at Northwestern university with the \$3,500 in cash and chattels he won in prize contests during the last five years.

His rewards included a bundle of money, a new automobile, an outboard motor, a bicycle, six cans of tuna fish, three refrigerators, and two watches.

He won 59 prizes. He averaged one prize out of each five entries.

Dr. N. L. Bosning Named To Minnesota University

EUGENE, Oct. 7. (AP)—Dr. Nelson L. Bosning of the University of Oregon faculty has been named head of the University of Minnesota's department of secondary education and will take his new post January 1. Dr. Donald M. Erb, U. of O. president, announced today.

Silver Falls Road Widening Ordered

Survey of a two-mile road in the Silver Falls district, was ordered by the county court yesterday in acting favorably on the petition of Frank Frazer and others for its establishment as a 40-foot county road. At present the road is narrow, winding and ungraveled although it serves several farms that have no outlet.

The court denied a petition of Claude Ames and others for a three-quarter mile road south of Swegle school because the petition called for a 40-foot road whereas, being within six miles of Salem, only a 60-foot road is permissible.

There were 769 accidents reported to the commission during the week.

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Hop Sales Made At Firmer Price

Carload Oregon '38 Crop Goes at 22 Cents, Best in Recent Weeks

While Oregon hop sales the past week reached only 125 bales, the market firmed up with these sales netting the grower 22 cents a pound as against a top of 18 1/2 cents in recent weeks. The sales were for foreign account and were 1938 hops.

The Weekly Hop Market Review reports Washington markets also developed additional firmness, with Yakima valley sales of 250 bales of good crop 1938 clusters bringing the growers 19 1/2 to 20 cents per pound. Puyallup valley reported no sales but there dealers were reported offering 21 cents a pound for 1938 fuggles but producers were said to be holding for 24 and 25 cents.

In California, sales totaled 123 bales, including 100 bales in Mendocino county for 20 cents and 23 bales in Sonoma county at 21 cents. Producers were holding for prices ranging 1 to 4 cents higher.

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
