Tabulation of Tax Collection Is Due

Tabulation showing the amount of personal income, intangibles and corporate excise taxes collected thus far during 1938 is now being prepared by the state tax commission and will be ready for release later this week, officials said.

Officials originally estimated that this year's taxes from these three sources would exceed \$5,200,000. Of this amount, approximately \$3,500,000 was collected prior to April 1, the last day for filing returns.

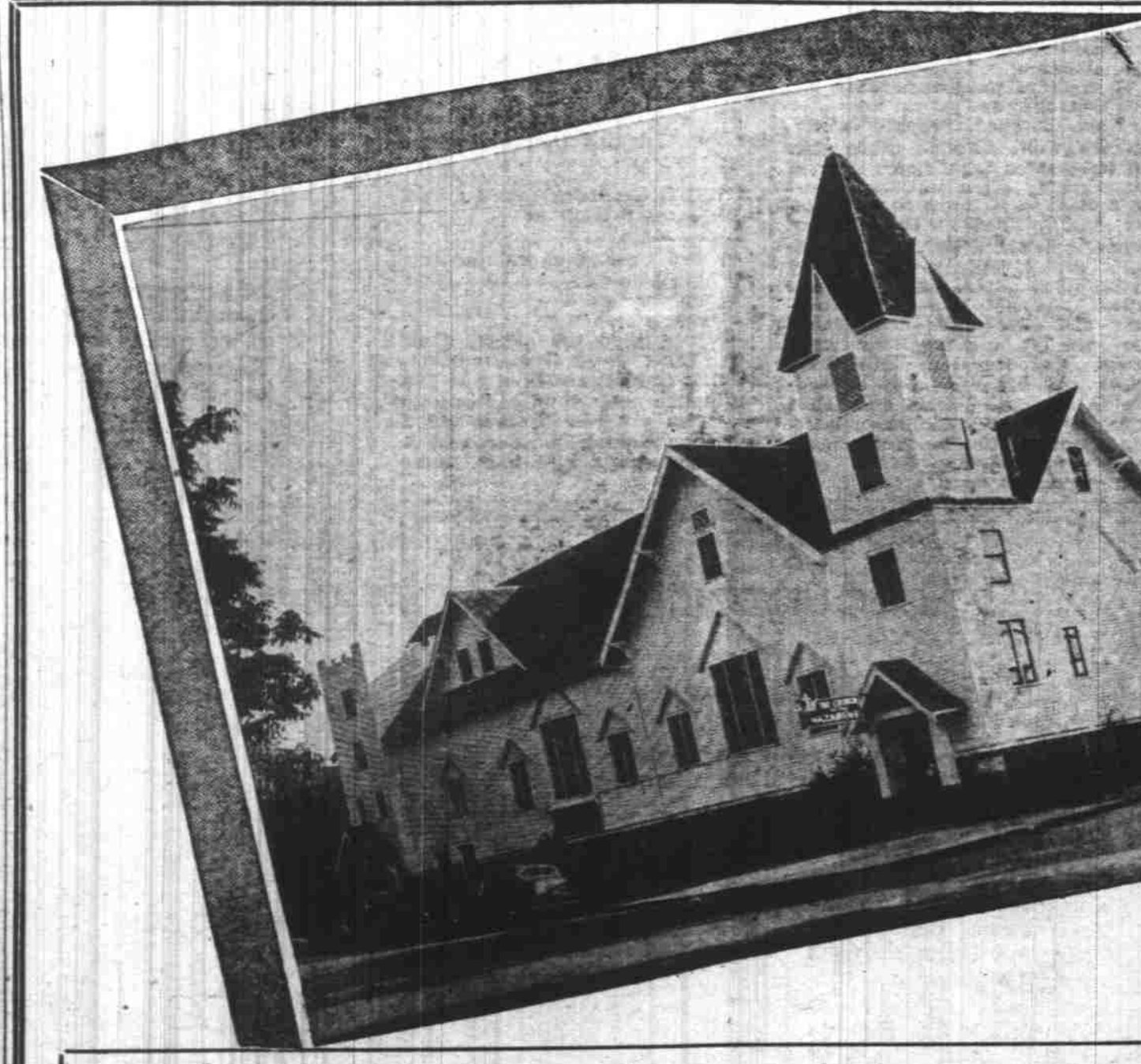
