132 Delegates Attend Meet at Lebanon; Blodgett Funeral Is Held

LEBANON—Dr. E. B. Hart of Corvallis was elected moderator of the Central Willamette Baptist association at the annual meeting here this week, attended by 132 delegates. Other officers are: secretary—treasurer, Mrs. Ethel Burns, Newberg; vice-moderator, Dr. Dickover; member state board, Mr. Stannard, Salem. Rev. Leroy Crossley of Lebanon is retiring moderator.

Main speakers of the session were Dr. W. C. Everson, Rev. K. Tobias, Corvallis; Rev. Harms of Eugene; Rev. Junker, Dr. Starring of Portland, and Dr. Macprash, Philadelphia, superintendent of Russia mission work.

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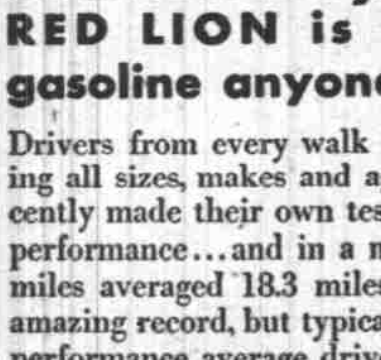
MERCHANT Homer V. Middlesburgh, Pomona, Calif., averaged 21.3 miles per gallon in his Ford V-8.
