Care of Furs Is Important as Selection

Most women know how to care for a wool coat but few know the essential points to the care of a fur one, and much of the life of a fur coat depends on the treatment it's given after the garment has been purchased.

When tears and lips appear they should be mended; always loosen the coat before letting down to ease strain on seams. Dirt, dust and grime invite moths and an occasional gentle beating with a flat stick will help remove dirt and lessen the hazard of moth damage. Gentle brushing with the grain, and a good shaking after wearing is always a help to the coat's appearance.

Remember that although an animal's fur sheds rain, when it becomes a coat there is no natural oil to repel moisture. An umbrella is an aid to care of the coat because soaking is bad for the leather although a little rain will not injure it.

After a good soaking fur should be dried in a cool place with good circulation, then shaken or brushed. Overheating is always bad for fur. Exposure to sun will dry the pelt and bleach the hairs.

Consumers who store furs in storage during the summer do so to preserve the fur and keep away from moths and the government publishes a document for storage of furs away from home to guard against moths stored at home. Furs should be kept as cool as possible, and should be shaken occasionally in months when not worn.

Noodles Make Nests for Meat's Container

Nests of noodles make attractive holders for sausage meat and provide the starch in the meal. Try this recipe for:

SAUSAGE CAKES IN NOODLE NESTS

1 pound bulk sausage
1 onion, minced
2 tablespoons flour
1/2 pound egg noodles
1 green pepper, chopped
1 tablespoon butter
Salt and pepper to taste
Form sausage into 6 flat cakes and fry. Add the chopped pepper, minced onion and seasoning. When sausage is cooked to a golden brown, remove from pan, pour off excess gravy, leaving about 1/4 cup of thick fryings. Add flour and stir until smooth. Boil egg noodles in salted water until tender. Drain. Form nests of noodles on platter, putting sausage cake into each nest. Pour gravy over sausage and noodles. Serve hot.

Honey Week Set for Late October

As long as honey week has been set for October 24 to 29 it might be a good idea to think of a recipe or two to enjoy that week and the ones that precede it.

Here is an all honey cookie that has not been tested in this department but was sent by the National Honey Institute, supposed to know their product and its uses.

ALL HONEY COOKY

1 cup butter
1 cup honey
2 teaspoons soda
1/2 teaspoon each cinnamon, cloves, allspice
3 1/2 cups flour (approximately)

Boil honey and butter together about one minute. Cool. Sift flour, spices and soda together. Add flour to make a soft dough. Roll thin, cut and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) for 12 to 15 minutes.

Caution—Because these cookies are thin they burn easily.

When young children are playing in the house in winter time it's a good idea to watch the heat close to the floor. The thermometer placed at eye level may indicate the correct heat for the room but nearer the floor the temperature may be away under proper room warmth.

Today's Menu Europeans Like Sauces for Meat, Fish

Cabbage salad served with garlic French dressing will make an interesting salad to precede the meal that includes:

Corned beef, egg platter
Baked potatoes
Buttered beets
Baked pears, whipped cream

CORNER BEEF, EGG AND OLIVE PLATTER

1 cup whole ripe olives
1 12-ounce can corned beef
6 eggs
1/2 cup milk
1/4 cup tomato hot sauce
1 tablespoon flour
Cut olives from pits in large slices. Slice corned beef and fry in butter or fat to brown. Combine eggs and milk and beat just enough to blend. Scramble in small quantity fat or butter. Combine tomato sauce, flour, and ripe olives and cook and stir until flour is cooked and mixture is slightly thickened. Arrange eggs in center of platter and corned beef around the edge. Pour sauce over eggs. Serves 4 to 6.

Fresh or Dried Beans In Lamb Stew

There's a very short time each fall when fresh lima beans are in market, and those who like the flavor of the dried limas will find even greater enjoyment in the fresh green ones. Maybe it's the name that sounds so good, but lamb and lima beans always touch the fancy of epicures. Here is one recipe for them.

LAMB AND LIMA BEAN STEW

2 pounds lamb chuck, shank or neck
1 pound lima beans
Salt and pepper
Celery salt
Soak lima beans over night, or better, use fresh ones. Place in heavy kettle. Have lamb boned and cut in 2 inch cubes. Add to beans, season with salt and pepper and cover with water. Simmer until done, two to two and a half hours.

Bananas Popular for Dessert Dish

That soft tropical elegance of bananas that all youngsters and most grown-ups like, makes delightful flavor in desserts and especially blends in texture with custards. Here's one example:

BANANA CUSTARD

1/4 cup sugar
3 tablespoons flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 cups milk
1 egg
1/4 teaspoon vanilla
1 ripe banana, diced
Mix together the sugar, flour and salt. Stir in milk. Cook until thickened, then cook over hot water 5 minutes. Add gradually to slightly beaten egg and cook 1 minute longer. Cool. Add vanilla and diced banana. Serves 6.



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
