Europeans Like Sauces for Meat, Fish

(Continued from page 6) ing point, strain and season to taste.

Sauce Bearnaise is used to accompany broiled steaks or fish.

BERNAISE SAUCE

- 3 tablespoons water
- 3 tablespoons tarragon vinegar
- 1/2 onion
- 4 egg yolks, slightly beaten
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- 4 tablespoons butter, creamed.

Put water, vinegar and onion in a small sauce pan, heat to the boiling point. Remove onion, gradually add egg yolks and then seasonings. Strain and cook over hot water until beginning to thicken. Add butter a tablespoon at a time and stir constantly.

Hollandaise is one of the most popular of sauces to serve with vegetables, fish or meats. True Hollandaise goes this way but is a difficult mixture to keep from curdling:

HOLLANDAISE SAUCE

- 1/2 cup butter
- 2 egg yolks
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- Few grains cayenne
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice.

Divide butter into three parts, put one piece in a heavy bowl with egg yolks and lemon juice. Cook over hot water, stirring constantly with wire whisk until butter melts. Add second piece of butter and as mixture thickens, the third piece. Remove from fire and season. If the mixture curdles, add 2 tablespoons heavy cream or boiling water, drop by drop.

Often a cup of white sauce is prepared and 2 egg yolks, 6 tablespoons butter and 1 tablespoon lemon juice are stirred in just before serving for a mock hollandaise sauce.

Sandwich Fillings Are All Ready

Whether the sandwiches you are making are for school lunches that must be made often and quickly, or if they are for afternoon tea a speedy way will be much appreciated by the maker of these little delights. Soften the butter first and cream it well, then add the flavored ingredient. To each 1/4 cup softened butter add one of the following:

- 1 tablespoon grated onion or onion juice and 1 tablespoon condensed tomato soup.
- 1 small can sardines, 2 tablespoons tomato paste, and 2 teaspoons lemon juice.
- 2 tablespoons condensed vegetable soup, finely chopped or broken up by fork.
- 1 teaspoon horseradish. (This would be good in a roast beef or ham sandwich. Keep it for meats that have outstanding flavor.)
- 2 teaspoons minced green pepper, 1 teaspoon mayonnaise.

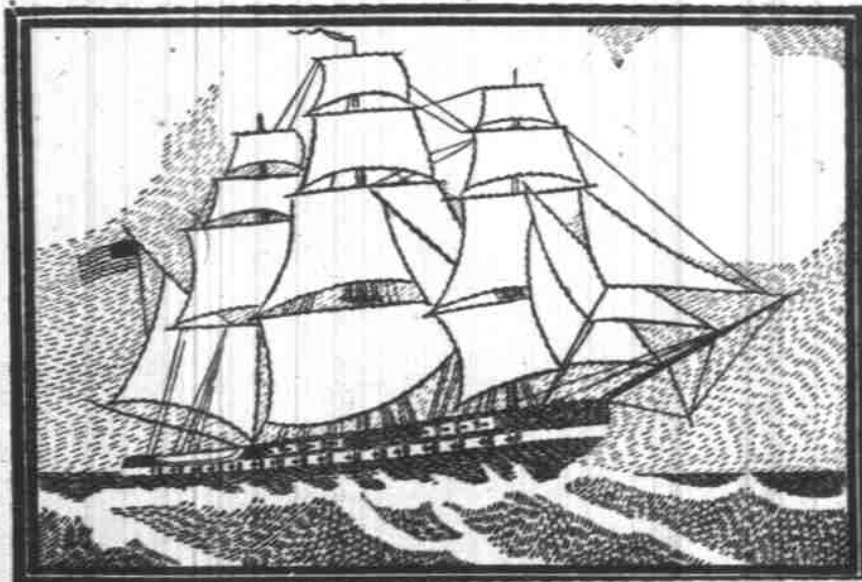
Non-High Budget For Linn Adopted

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Johnson Praises Temperance Play

"Price of Drink" Drama Aid to Cause, Asserts Head of League

The drama and trial, "The Price of a Drink," which will be presented in the Salem Johnson Memorial Seventh Day Adventist church, North Eugene at Hood streets, tonight at 7:45 p.m., marks an important development in the launching of a new temperance program in Oregon, according to Mr. Hayward H. Johnson, state superintendent of the Anti-Liquor League of Oregon. "Temperance education is the foundation for the solution of the whole liquor problem," says Mr. Johnson. "Before repeal, the 'wet' fostered the idea that the drys advocated, and through prohibition, substituted force for education. The temperance educational program that preceded adoption of national prohibition was virtually discarded when the law went into effect," sponsors of the play admit. "And this fact," they say, "doubtless figured in the bringing about of repeal."

Now those devoted to the temperance cause are turning to the educational program. The drama has been presented to Salem audiences during the last week to packed churches.

Dr. Charles J. Stauffacher, one of the great personalities in the missionary world, and on furlough from service as a medical missionary to Portuguese East Africa, will speak tonight at 7:30 o'clock at the First Methodist church on his experiences in the "dark continent." He will also address the Willamette university chapel at 11 o'clock this morning, this message to be broadcast over KSLM.

Ministry Extensive
His ministry of medicine includes 800,000 Africans representing the Batwa and Batonga tribes and covers a territory of 60,000 square miles. He has created a main hospital at Gikuki, 15 out-stations and has also directed construction of a 200-patient leprosarium and a branch colony with as many patients as the main colony.
