Arts League Is Disbanded by Members

At a meeting of the Salem Arts League on Wednesday night, members of the 20-year-old organization accepted the recommendation of the council and disbanded indefinitely. The action was decided upon, because in the past few years the work of the league has been replaced by other organizations.

The writers' section, first organized and most active of the groups of the Salem Arts league, was organized in 1918 at the home of Miss Clara Virginia Barton. Attending the meeting were Miss Laura Pratt, now of Corvallis, Miss Renska Swart, Mr. and Mrs. William Fordyce Fargo and Mr. Fargo's mother, Mrs. Emily Fargo. Of the charter members, Mrs. Fargo, Miss Swart, and Miss Pratt remain.

This group, which has a large membership, will continue as the Salem Writers' club, with meetings as usual. It has become a writers' forum where authors review work for the criticism of the club. Some of its members are regular contributors to magazines, others have occasional publications accepted.

In 1919 the Salem Arts league was organized in several groups, but as there was no provision for financing, after several years various groups drew away from the league.

The drama section finally became the Salem Civic players, the art division reorganized into the Rembrandt Artists' guild, the music and history groups, which were small, disbanded to join other organizations. The art league, in its action of Wednesday night, announced that members would help to further the interests of the Salem Art center, but with a right to reorganize, should there be a need for the league in the future. Books are being filed with Miss Renska Swart, money in the treasury is being used to buy books for the Salem public library with Mrs. Ora F. McIntyre as head of the committee to assist the librarian, Miss Mildred Olson, in selection of proper publications. Mrs. Blanche M. Jones was president of the Salem Arts league.

So this fine organization, which has accomplished so much in the last 20 years, has passed out of existence, making way for progress.
