# **YWCA Offers** Wide Service

Growth of Organization in Salem Is Outlined; Covers 25 Years

From a modest beginning 25 ears ago the Salem YWCA has kept pace with the growing demands of the community it serves and has expanded in size and scope to meet the needs thrust upon it by the constantly increasing population of Marion county and particularly the city of Salem. When founded in 1913 by a group of civic-minded members of the Women's club, efforts were confined to establishing and maintaining in a building now occupied by Steusloff's market a cafeteria and lounging room for ladies led by Mrs. W. E. Kirk and Mrs. John Lewis as president and secretary and including, among others, Mrs. John Albert, Mrs. Bush, Mrs. Paul Wallace, Mrs. Charles Mc-Nary, Mrs. C. A. Parks and Mrs. Chauncey Bishop. As active com-mittee workers this effort was crowned with such signal success games and the sports they love new fields soon challenged their attention. In order to meet the challenge,

The YWCA residence is closely related to the employment office.

When the need is imperative, and often it is, a girl seeking work is given a place to stay until such time as she is employed and can afford to pay for her lodging. # Mrs. Cooter Plans Valley Game Aid

Candidate to Legislature Perturbed Over Decline of Birds, Animals

"What has become of the Willamette valley's China pheasants, quail, ducks, geese and other game?"-Mrs. Cora H. Cooter says is a question many Marion county people ask her as she visits over the county in her campaign for a seat in the legislature.

"Who can answer this question," she asks, 'and what is the remedy? Do the Izaak Walton league and organized sportsmen of Marion county have a program to meet the continuing disappearance of game here?'
