

Tax Delinquency Form Soon Ready

450 Parcels of Property to Get Certificates When Ready

Copy for forms on which certificates of tax delinquency will be made out is in the hands of the printer with the job expected to be completed for use by Sheriff A. C. Burk's tax department within a few days, T. J. Brabec,

Property owners whose lands aer subject to immediate foreclosure under the mandatory foreclosure law may avert such action on the county's part by paying their current tax, the 1935 tax, if any of it is unpaid, and threequarters of the oldest delinquent tax of prior years, before the certificates of delinquency are issued, Brabec advised. After issuance of certificates but before foreclosure Business' Duties proceedings are started, owners may redeem their lands by payment of all taxes due.

Brabec estimated there were 450 parcels of property on which be issued as soon as the forms are printed. Since the first of the year approximately 250 owners have made sufficient tax payments to remove their lands from the foreclosure list.
