Hominy Fried to Go With Meats

Hominy grits replace the old time long cooking variety that we used to know. Sauted hominy grits make a good fried dish to serve with the meat course.

Stir one cup of flour into each cup of hominy grits to be cooked; pour slowly into boiling salted water (1 teaspoon salt to each quart of water) in top of double boiler. Set over boiling water and cook until grits are tender and water absorbed - about 1 hour. Pour into mold which has been rinsed with cold water. When mixture is thoroughly cold and firm, cut into slices and saute unth crisp and golden brown.
