

CIO Is Upheld In New Jersey

Federal Court Forbids
Interference With
Assembly Right

NEWARK, N. J., Oct. 27.—(AP)—Federal court upheld today the CIO's "right" to go into Jersey City safe from the "deportations" it charged were resorted to by police to frustrate organizational activities.

The ruling by Judge William Clark was filed in an injunction suit started by the CIO and allied organizations last January—a day after Mayor Frank Hague declared the CIO "shall never come into this city as long as I am mayor."

Judge Clark also forbade any interference with the "right" to distribute leaflets on the street, carry placards and to speak in public parks. The decision made no mention of the plaintiffs' plea to hold meetings and make speeches on the street.

Organizers Ejected

The CIO and the American Civil Liberties union's suit against Mayor Hague and fellow officials was brought six weeks after the labor union's first attempt at public organization of industrial workers was thwarted by police who arrested 13 organizers and sympathizers and ejected others from the city. The suit charged Jersey City officials with entering into "an unlawful plan and conspiracy" to forbid discussion of CIO work.

Although upholding the plaintiffs' right to speak in public parks, the court in a 15,000-word decision, recommended a "modified form of public censorship." Judge Clark said such censorship "must have as a condition precedent some proof that the particular persons applying for permits had on previous occasions addressed similar audiences with resulting disturbances."

Not until then, the decision said, were city authorities justified in demanding either a copy of the proposed speech or binding the speaker to keep the peace.

"No Evidence"

The court said there was "no competent evidence" to support the plaintiffs' charges that city officials intimidated owners of private meeting halls against renting to them. It was charged in the suit that the city administration had threatened to increase tax assessments or deprive owners or lessees of licenses if they rented to the complainants.

Referring to the petition for a restraining order against interference with picketing, union organization and other rights under the national labor relations act, the court declared it had upheld these rights already in another injunction case involving Jersey City. An appeal in this case is now pending in the third circuit court of appeals, Philadelphia. Judge Clark, who sat in the present case as a district court judge, is now a member of the circuit court.

Picket Law Might Bring on Boycott

PENDLETON, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Labor is so universally opposed to Oregon's anti-picketing initiative that its passage might result in the boycott of Oregon products in other states, two Oregon labor leaders warned yesterday.

They were D. E. Nickerson, Portland, executive secretary of the State Federation of Labor, and W. E. Regan, Pendleton, state chairman and representative of the legislative committee of the order of railway conductors. They issued a joint statement attacking the bill designed to regulate picketing and boycotting by labor. "We don't need any more laws," Nickerson declared. "We have plenty now to punish offenders." Regan charged that "employer groups evidently had some of their lawyers draft the measure."

Bookie Sought



Los Angeles authorities recently sought a "campus bookmaker" who allegedly received most of the \$27,000 which Eric S. Richardson is accused of embezzling from the student loan fund at the University of California at Los Angeles. Richardson, former auditor of the college, admitted obtaining the money by means of forgery, the district attorney's office said. Most of the money went to the bookmaker, said to have his stand at a store on the campus. Richardson allegedly told police.

It is an entirely new form of encephalitis, or inflammation of the brain, caused by a filterable virus which disintegrates the tissues, Dr. Roy F. Feemster of the Massachusetts department of public health in Boston told the American Public Health association's convention here today.

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Japan Answer Is Undecided

Japan to Take Determined
Stand in Negotiations
With all Powers

TOKYO, Oct. 27.—(AP)—The Japanese foreign office said today that the date of replying to the now three-week-old United States warning against closing of the "open door" in China was indefinite.

The 2,000-word protest against "unwarranted interference" with American rights in China, divulged in Washington today but not published in Japan, asked an early reply.

"The government of the United States believes that in the interest of relations between the United States and Japan an early reply would be helpful."—This was the concluding paragraph of the note.

Presented October 6 by Ambassador Joseph C. Grew whose signature it carried. Concurrently with its disclosure in Washington, authoritative sources in Tokyo said Sir Robert Leslie Craigie, British ambassador,

was scheduled to reopen conversations tomorrow with the Japanese.

It was understood the British envoy was attempting to map adjustments of all difficulties over Japanese occupation in China.

Sources close to the government said Japan would take "a determined stand" in negotiations with foreign powers over rights and privileges previously enjoyed in China. The status of foreign concessions and settlements at Canton, Shanghai, Hankow and Tientsin will be of particular concern.

Occupations Celebrated

At the same time Tokyo celebrated occupation of the Hankow district, commercial heart of China, and War Minister Lieut. Gen. Seishiro Itagaki told the nation that "the armed dispute between China and Japan will be little affected by the fall of the Wuhan area."

The war minister's statement said the Yangtze valley victory did not mean termination of hostilities.

"The conflict has just begun," the statement added, cautioning Japanese against relaxation. "The people must devote all its efforts toward long-term construction. . . . The only way to console the spirits of the fallen (soldiers) is to attain the objectives of our holy crusade and thereby meet the expectations of the throne."

BOSTON, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Grandma Mary Sullivan, 63, was permitted under a court ruling today to continue her backyard bag punching to help her arthritis.

A neighbor, Mrs. Emma Kaizis, had charged that it was a noisy nuisance and sought a court ban.
