

Planners Talk Trio Projects

Sewage System, Widening of Roads, Beautification Are Considered

SILVERTON—Sewage system, market roads and beautification were the three subjects brought up before the planning council at its Wednesday night meeting presided over by T. Leonard. Dr. P. A. Loar, chairman of the sewer system committee, reported that more investigation had to be made before the matter of a special election was presented to the city council. He explained that the city only had two items in the building of the sewer to meet, the cost of pipe and the cost of the engineering. Pipe could now be had, the government officials had figured, for \$9000 which is about one third the cost if purch-

ased through ordinary channels. The cost of engineering, the WPA estimated should not be over \$3,200, but, Dr. Loar said, a local engineer figured it at \$5,335.

It was pointed out that at even the highest figures the project which would ordinarily cost the city \$150,000 would cost less than \$20,000 under WPA.

Want Road Widened
The subject of widening and resurfacing the road between Silverton and Salem was widely discussed. The council voted to ask the chamber of commerce to put forth further effort in this line and to ask the cooperation of Mt. Angel business men.

The beautification plans were divided into three divisions, beautification of local parks, streets and streams, and the beautification of roadsides entering Silverton.

The first division was left in the hands of the woman's club committee composed of Mrs. L. G. McDonald, Mrs. A. P. Solle and Mrs. Jay Morley, already at work. Reber Allen was appointed as chairman of the street and stream beautification plans and Herbert Michaelbrook, Byron Gordon and Fred Sears, were appointed to contact grange and community clubs surrounding Silverton to ask their assistance in roadside beautification.
