

FDR Inspects New Warplanes

President Views Craft Army Says Are Best Fighting Ships

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—(P)—President Roosevelt spent two hours this afternoon inspecting the nation's newest fighting planes, including two craft which army men believe are the world's fastest military ships.

The two speed planes are capable of flying more than six miles a minute and operating at six miles altitude.

Making his first trip to nearby Bolling and Anacostia fields since he came to the White House, the president was accompanied by Secretaries Morgenthau and Stimson, Assistant Secretary of War Louis Johnson, Assistant Secretary of Navy Charles Edison, and many other high army and navy officers.

Carlisle Viewed
He paid particular attention to the army's new Curtiss P-40 pursuit plane, never before seen publicly. Its performance and speed have not yet been disclosed, but army air corps officers say they believe it came to the fighting plane of its type the world.

It was flown here especially from Wright Field, Dayton, Ohio, for the president to see.

The plane, only recently finished and still undergoing performance tests, is an advance over the P-35 and P-37 types which have flown 360 miles an hour.

The newest ship has not yet been opened up for its speed tests, but army officers seemed confident this mark would be left behind when the throttle was fully opened.

The president paused in his open car in front of the new "mystery" ship and studied its lines intently. Brigadier General Henry H. Arnold, chief of the air corps, pointed out its innovations.

Tschantz Injured In Auto Collision

SILVERTON, Oct. 29.—Orval Tschantz of Silvertown suffered a broken arm and other injuries late Saturday night when the automobile he was driving collided in a collision with a hit-and-run driver's machine on North Water street near the Eastman company's plant.

Tschantz was taken to the Silvertown hospital where his general condition was uncertain.

Other occupants of the car he was driving were Helen Vorsteth, Olive Green and Emil Ryan. They suffered only from shock.

The uninjured members of the party said the Tschantz car was going west on Water street and that a sedan crowded them off the roadway and crashed into them, then went on although this car was damaged, leaving its tail light and bumper at the scene of the accident.

Tactics of Goons
Opposed by Hess

DALLAS, (Special).—Henry L. Hess, democratic gubernatorial nominee, Saturday night chose this center of recent labor violence investigations to tell his opposition to "goon" tactics before a large crowd at a democratic rally held at the courthouse.

The republican parade on Thursday night also will start at Marion square at 7 o'clock, and will include five bands and a fraternal marching unit. The program proper, at the armory, will start at 8 o'clock, but there will be band music starting at 7:45. Further details will be found elsewhere in this issue.

Charles A. Sprague, republican nominee for governor, returned to his home in Salem last night after campaigning in northwest Oregon during most of the past week. He spoke at Hillsboro Saturday night. He will spend the weekend at his home here, resting up for the final drive of the campaign. Early this week he will tour Yamhill county and return to Salem for the big rally Thursday night. Saturday night he is scheduled to speak at Albany.

Radio broadcasts on behalf of the Sprague campaign are scheduled as follows: Monday night over KGW at 10:15; Tuesday night over KOIN at 9:45; Wednesday night at 7 p.m. over KSLM. This local broadcast will be by Glen C. Wade, former district manager of the Townsend movement in the second congressional district of Oregon. His topic will be "Why the Aged Are Looking to Sprague."

There was a big crowd at the Social Welfare society meeting at the courthouse Saturday afternoon. The Marion county legislative candidates, in person or by spokesmen, outlined their views on the pension problem, and a resolution adopted at the close of the meeting stated that judged by past record and public statements, nearly all of them are in sympathy with the attainable efforts to liberalize the Oregon old age assistance setup "so as to take, so far as possible under the federal Social Security act, all taint of pauperism out of old age assistance and to make it possible to give all of our citizens over 65 years of age the full benefit of what is now available for their assistance from the federal government."

Germans Halt Jew Expulsion

Negotiations With Poland to Decide Status of Polish Citizens

BERLIN, Oct. 29.—(P)—German authorities called a halt tonight to the mass expulsion of Polish Jews pending the opening of negotiations Monday to regulate the status of all Polish citizens in Germany.

The action was taken simultaneously with an announcement in Warsaw that Poland had abandoned plans for retaliatory measures against Germans residing there.

More than 20,000 Polish Jews had been herded on both sides of the border by Germany in a counter move to a new Polish citizenship law which Berlin authorities feared would leave thousands of these citizens stranded in the Reich without passports.

The eleventh hour decision to halt the movement of Polish Jews toward the border came after Polish representatives told German authorities they had misinterpreted the new citizenship regulations of the neighboring republic.

Order Trains Returned
Deportation trains which had carried thousands to the frontier since the sudden roundup started yesterday were ordered to return.

Of the more than 20,000 Polish Jews at the border, some 12,000 already had been deported on their home soil when the roundup order was issued.

Conditions were deplorable among the deportees, especially on the Silesian border when bitter weather added to the discomforts of weary train rides.

They were permitted to take only ten marks (4) each from the country and many men had to leave their wives and families behind, uncertain what was to become of them.

Hungary Submits Plea to Arbiters

BUDAPEST, Oct. 29.—(P)—Hungary officially notified Czechoslovakia today she was submitting her territorial dispute with that country to the arbitration of Germany and Italy.

Hungarian officials said they felt their persuasion of Czechoslovakia to accept Germany and Italy as arbitrators was a "great diplomatic victory."

Czechoslovakia notified Hungary of her acceptance of arbitration by the two powers last Wednesday for settlement of the boundary by which purely Magyar districts are expected to be ceded to Hungary.

Czechoslovakia did not accept Budapest's proposal, however, that plebiscites be held in the rest of Slovakia and Ruthenia, the eastern provinces of Czechoslovakia which separate Hungary and Poland.

Warden Selection Due Late in Week

Selection of a warden of the Oregon state penitentiary to succeed James W. Lewis, who died Friday, will not be considered by the state board of control until late this week, Governor Charles H. Martin announced Saturday.

Men prominently mentioned in connection with the position Saturday included Gene Halley, deputy warden, and George Alexander, deputy superintendent of state police.

Halley has served as deputy warden at the prison for many years and is now in charge of the institution. Alexander once served as sheriff of Washington county and later as state prohibition officer.

Officials said two or three applications for the job already had been received.

Furniture Unions Reject Proposals

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 29.—(P)—By a unanimous vote, the furniture workers' union rejected a counter wage proposal today from the B. P. John corporation, one of Portland's two largest furniture makers tied up since October 1 by a dispute over wages.

The company proposed a 10 per cent wage reduction against an original proposal of a 10-cent hourly cut. A union official said the new proposal would reduce wages 6 1/2 cents an hour.

They were right. An ambulance staff interne sniffed and solved the mystery. The victim was revived and taken to police station on a charge of drunkenness.

Hague's Opponent Parades With Gag

JERSEY CITY, N. J., Oct. 29.—(P)—A veteran political battler against Mayor Frank Hague abandoned an announced attempt to make a public speech in defiance of authorities tonight and instead paraded before a hostile crowd wearing a gag and carrying a sandwich board.

James F. (Jeff) B. R. K. released from jail a week ago after a six months' sentence which resulted from a previous effort to speak in the open, was saved by 20 policemen from the angry fists of a crowd in a busy downtown street.

Burkitt's automobile had been parked at the street corner all day with signs proclaiming his intention to speak there "as an American citizen free from all laws."

Tonight, he appeared with a handkerchief around his mouth and a sandwich board announcing: "I have been gagged by Hague the tyrant in the year 1933 B. C."

Policemen formed a protective circle around him as the awaiting crowd shouted and gesticulated menacingly.

Political Spoils Seekers Scorched

Infant Burned In Coal Stove

Screaming Mother Grabs Child From Firebox of Heater

COLUMBUS, Ga., Oct. 29.—(P)—A three-months-old baby girl died of burns today a few hours after she was snatched from the firebox of a coal heater by her screaming mother, Mrs. T. E. Turner.

Police Captain J. T. Spence said Mrs. Lucile M. Adams, the Turner's landlady, placed the infant in the firebox and later told neighbors she was "sending her son to join his father."

Woman Charged
He said Mrs. Adams, a widow, was taken to a hospital for mental observation, and before the baby's death, was charged with assault with intent to murder. The officer added the widow apparently was under the delusion the child was her son.

The heater was a large one of the circulator type used in a room of the house.

Babe's Clothes Aflame
Mrs. Turner told officers she left her baby, Priscilla Ann, with Mrs. Adams at the latter's request. She left the room, she said, but on smelling smoke, returned and found the infant with its clothing aflame. She was burned about the hands when she dragged her tiny daughter from the heater.

Neighbors were attracted by screams of the mother and child. Captain Spence quoted neighbors as saying Mrs. Adams told them she had rocked Priscilla Ann to sleep before she put her in the heater.

Spence said he was informed Mrs. Adams suffered a nervous breakdown several years ago. The baby's father is a tobacco salesman.

Appeal by Radio Proves Effective

CHICAGO, Oct. 29.—(P)—The poignant appeal to Henry Walther to come to the side of his mother, who is desperately ill, has reached him in the remote reaches of Alaska.

The persistent efforts of amateur radio transmitters through four days was rewarded tonight when a message from Henry, cabled and then relayed, reached his home.

It said: "Message received through K7ATD at King Cove. Would take at least a month to return."

Hope that Walther could make the trip in less than a week developed from a report by John H. Bremer, amateur operator who got the message through, that three airplanes had been located within reach of King Cove on the Alaskan peninsula.

Louis Walther, the youth's father, declared, "If some generous soul will pick him up and bring him home, I'd be tickled to death."

Mrs. Walther is suffering from cancer, complicated by heart disease.

Menuhin said in a statement he "suspected" Mrs. Leland Atherton Irish, executive vice-president of the Los Angeles philharmonic orchestra, had acted "without the knowledge and consent of the board of directors" in insisting the violinist must belong to the union before appearing with the orchestra next week.

"We intend to see this thing through to the very finish," the elder Menuhin declared.

Menuhin said his son would arrive in Los Angeles for the Nov. 3 and 4 concerts, for which he is to receive \$3,000, and declared he expected the contract which was entered into some time ago to be fulfilled.

Action Is Filed Against Steamer
