County Red Cross Setup Completed

Road Bids Set For \$650,000

Klamath Undercrossing Is Main Job; Highway Garage Here Due

Bids for road and bridge construction aggregating a cost of approximately \$650,000 will be opened at a two day meeting of the state highway commission to be held in Portland November 17 and 18. R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, announced Wednesday.

Among the outstanding projects is the main street undercrossing in Klamath Falls. The cost of this improvement was estimated at \$120,000, including a traffic signal system and electric wiring and lighting.

PTA to Sponsor Radio Dramatics

Broadcasts Are Designed to Increase Interest in Education

A series of weekly radio programs in dramatic form, to further education as a home-school-community responsibility, will be sponsored beginning Nov. 16 by the national congress of parents and teachers. It was announced yesterday from the office of Silas Galsler, city school superintendent.

Purpose of the broadcasts is to stimulate general interest in the education and welfare of children and people. Emphasis will be placed on education as a continuous process which goes on in the home and in the community, as well as in the school, and an effort will be made to encourage closer cooperative effort in local communities for the education of youth.

Family is Medium
Dramatizations will be used in which a typical American family will be the medium for introducing educational topics and problems. Home, classroom, or community situations, will be the background for the discussion of problems.

The seven initial programs will be: "Jimmy Runs Away," Nov. 16; "Children Are Persons," Nov. 23; "Everybody Joins a Club," Nov. 30; "Let's Give Them Books," Dec. 7; "Keeping the Family Well," Dec. 14; "She Hasn't a Thing to Wear," Dec. 21; and "No Fun at Home," Dec. 28. These educational programs will be broadcast over the blue network of the National broadcasting system.

Cooking Sessions Drawing to Close

How to cook a complete meal in 12 minutes seems to be the problem involved at the Montgomery-Ward & Co. cooking school this week but, according to A. R. Elmore the chef in charge, this is not a problem but an actual accomplishment.
