Prices Boom To new High

Heaviest Buying of Year Is Developed on Heels of GOP Wins. NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—(AP)—The heaviest buying of the year surged into the stock exchange today behind the election turn against the new deal and share prices boomed to the highest levels of the 1938 bull market.

In the exuberant advance, carrying some 300 listed stocks to new tops for the year or longer, trading surpassed 3,000,000 shares for the first time since the October, 1937 collapse in speculative markets.

Apparently the scope of the republican victory, touching a dozen strategic states, exceeded the financial districts' expectations. It combined with the recent vigorous industrial recovery in the United States to unleash buying force.

Setting the forward pace, United States Steel soared 3% to 69 1/2, Bethlehem 3% to 75 1/4, Youngstown Sheet 3% to 54 1/2, and General Motors 1% to 53 1/2, all to new 1938 peaks.

Increase Export Buying and Stronger Securities Boost Wheat. CHICAGO, Nov. 9.—(AP)—Enlarged European buying, together with soaring of securities, helped to lift wheat prices a full cent here today, but profit-taking later curtailed gains somewhat.

It was estimated that upward of 2,000,000 bushels of North American wheat had been bought for overseas the last two days. The greater part was understood to be wheat either float on the ocean or in store board, and mostly Canadian.

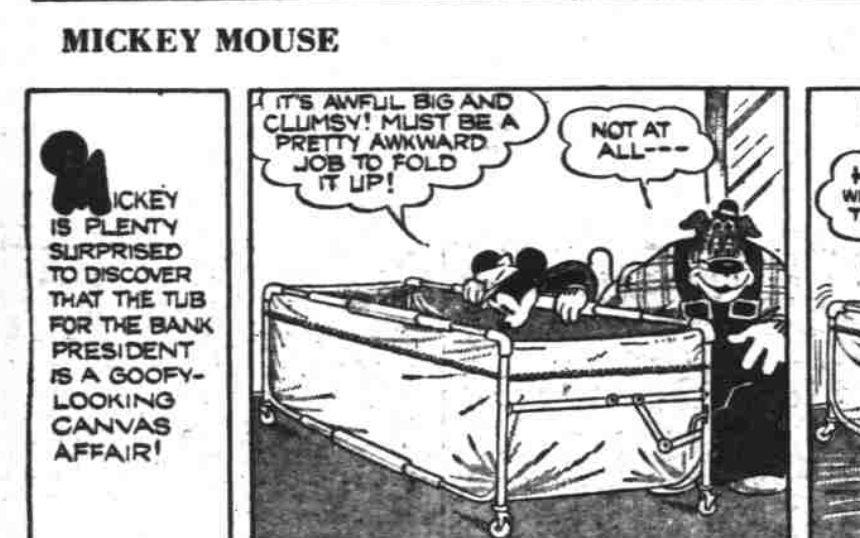
