Nazis Assess \$400,000,000 Fine on Jews

Jewish Business Wiped out by Governmental Decrees

Jews Barred From Public Entertainments; Must Pay Damages

BERLIN, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Nazi Germany today practically wiped out Jewish business, barred the nation's 500,000 Jews from public entertainments and fined them \$400,000,000 for the slaying of a German diplomat by a young Polish-German Jew in Paris.

In addition, the government required that Jews whose 1090 Berlin shops were wrecked or looted Thursday in mass demonstrations must pay for the damage themselves. Insurance claims by Jews for demolition of their properties must be paid to the state.

Officials promised "further decisive measures" and Jews feared that the ghetto, unemployment or concentration camps were in store for them as the result of the most violent government and private anti-Semitic actions Nazi Germany yet has seen.

Wholesale Arrests Made in Berlin

Police made wholesale arrests among Jewish moneyed, educated and cultured classes, 1500 being taken into custody in Berlin alone. In Vienna it was estimated that between 18,000 and 20,000 Jews had been arrested since Thursday. Many of them were released, but thousands still were in custody.

While the anti-semitic campaign was intensified, there were new manifestations against Catholics. Arouned Nazis in Munich shattered many windows in the palace of Michael Cardinal Von Faulhaber at Munich.

The fine of 1,000,000,000 marks (\$400,000,000) against German Jews "in their entirety" for the slaying of Ernst Von Rath, secretary of the German embassy at Paris, represents from one-fourth to one-fifth of the estimated Jewish wealth in Germany, excluding Austria and Sudenland, before Thursday's outbreaks.

Fine May Come From Jewish Businesses

When and how the fine would be collected was not announced, but since Jewish business must be given up, it was assumed part of the sum would come from this source.

Decrees against Jews issued today:

1. Prohibited Jews from conducting retail businesses, mail order and commission houses and independent handicraft enterprises after Jan. 1;
2. Barred Jews from heading any industrial or commercial concern;
3. Ordered Jews excluded from theatres, movie houses, concerts and other public presentations.

Hermann Wilhelm Goering, director of Germany's four-year plan for economic self-sufficiency, issued the decree providing the \$400,000,000 fine.

In the attack on Cardinal Von Faulhaber's palace at Munich, a crowd broke between 60 and 70 panes on the ground floor after the cardinal had sought police protection.

The march on the palace started in early morning. The crowd had retired to beer halls after hearing Adolf Wagner, Nazi district leader for Bavaria and Bavarian minister of interior, denounce "Roman Catholic allies of Jews."

Van Nuys Margin In Indiana Falls

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 12.—(AP)—A change in vote tabulations in Howard county, adding approximately 1,000 ballots to the republican total, tonight apparently boosted James M. Tucker, youthful Paoli attorney, into the Indiana secretary of state's chair, giving the revitalized GOP at least two state offices.

The revision allied democratic US Senator Frederick Van Nuys' unofficial triumph over Raymond E. Willis to 5,992 votes, and served to strengthen his determination to challenge returns in Tuesday's election. The GOP state committee and candidates will gather here tomorrow to map final strategy in their plans to impound votes and voting machines in six counties.

Senator Van Nuys, whose new total under the revised tabulations was 784,974, could not be reached for comment. Willis, who has refused steadfastly to concede election of his opponent, had a total of 780,982 votes.

ANTI-JEWISH DEMONSTRATIONS SMASH WINDOWS

Young Jew Weeps At Shots Results

Jewish Assassin Mourns Trouble He Caused His People

PARIS, Nov. 12.—(AP)—The young Polish Jew who killed the secretary of the German embassy was said by police to have alternately wept and prayed when he learned of the 1,000,000,000-mark fine levied on German Jews because of his act.

Police said he cried: "Is this the price for the act of one desperate, foolish man like me?"

Previously the prisoner, Herschel Grynszpan, 17, had said he would "pray every Monday for forgiveness for what I have done to my people." He shot Ernest Von Rath last Monday and the diplomat died Thursday.

Abraham and Chana Grynszpan, uncle and aunt of the youth, were arrested today on charges of complicity in the case as French Foreign Minister Bonnet and high officials of the German government attended Von Rath's funeral.

Von Rath's body was taken to the German frontier, there to be transferred to a German train and taken to Duesseldorf for burial.

Fear Elk Hunters Lost in Blizzards

LA GRANDE, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Fear that heavy snows falling in the Blue mountains have jeopardized upwards of 100 elk hunters grew today as state police, game and forestry officials heard many rumors of missing men.

State police said no specific instances of any person being lost had been received although they did not doubt that scores who drove into the mountains are marooned. Game and forestry officials sent expert woodsmen into the mountains to help stranded hunters.

The Mt. Emily Lumber company's camp at Starkey has been assisting hunters out of Fly valley with caterpillars. Gerald Tucker, a forest supervisor, returned here last night after aiding in a search for a man named Sheaman of Portland, who was found after being reported lost for 33 hours.

Jews Flee Germany

METZ, France, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Hundreds of Jews fleeing from Germany were turned back at the French frontier by border guards acting on strict orders from Paris.

Fire Rages out of Control At Huge Liquor Distillery

OWENSBORO, Ky., Nov. 12.—(AP)—A wild fire raged out of control here tonight at the Glenmore distillery, one of the largest in the country.

James Pendleton, managing editor of the Owensboro Messenger, said firemen and company officials told him they had small hope of saving the plant from complete destruction.

Decision Unmade On Rosser's Fate

OLYMPIA, Wash., Nov. 12.—(AP)—Officials studied the possible extradition of Al E. Rosser, former Oregon AFL teamster secretary, to Washington today but said no decision would be reached until Monday.

Rosser, convicted of arson in Polk county, Ore., is held for Skamania county at Portland on charges of using explosives. He has posted bond on charges in three Oregon counties. Bail in Skamania county was set at \$25,000.

Il Duce's Paper Interprets Vote

Election Outcome Is Held Warning to Roosevelt on Europe Plans

MILAN, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Premier Mussolini's newspaper Popolo d'Italia today interpreted the American election returns as a warning to President Roosevelt not to plunge too hastily into European affairs.

"Mr. Roosevelt's train was running too fast," the paper said. "Now they (the American voters) have noticed it and stopped it long enough to hang a sign under the presidential window 'dangerous to lean out.'"

"The European landscape may be admired through closed windows just as well and without the danger of catching cold."

The paper noted the interpretation of the Berliner Tageblatt that the elections meant reaction against the anti-fascist policy of the government.

"Maybe so," Il Popolo commented, "but that does not mean that Roosevelt's adversaries, suddenly multiplied, are pro-fascist. We are more inclined to believe that American public opinion, which up until Munich abandoned itself to excessive confidence in the crushing moral force of the democracies, saw at Munich that all things considered it was not convenient to lean out too far."

"The totalitarian states were shown to be a more impregnable force than the Americans believed."

Grid Player Exonerated In Death of Tigard Tot

PORTLAND, Nov. 12.—(AP)—A young football player driving to join his team for an Armistice day clash fatally injured little Dick Heffron, 7, of Tigard last night. The driver, Harry Chandler, 19, of Tigard high school, was absolved.

Scenes of wild confusion in the vicinity of the plant were described by Pendleton.

Steusloff Funeral Is to Be Monday

W. H. Steusloff Known as Meat Packer Through Northwest

William Henry Steusloff, 79, one of the men who founded and developed the Valley Packing company here and known throughout the northwest as a meat packer, died at the residence, 1285 Court street, yesterday noon following a long illness.

Funeral services, conducted by Pacific lodge No. 50, AF & AM of which the deceased was a member, will be held Monday at 2 p. m. from the W. T. Rigdon chapel.

Mr. Steusloff was born in Germany in 1859 and came to America as a youth of seven, with his father, Henry Steusloff. Both of his parents died at Buffalo, N. Y., before he reached the age of 15 and he was thrown on his own resources.

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8 People Missing In \$250,000 Fire

ROUYN, Quebec, Nov. 12.—(CP)—Eight persons were reported missing today after a \$250,000 fire which wiped out an entire block in the main business section of this mining town in northern Quebec.

The search for the possible victims was hampered by flames which continued to smoulder in the ruins several hours after the fire started in the three-story Albert hotel and spread quickly to the Commercial hotel and a half dozen smaller buildings.

Three persons were injured, two critically, by the pre-dawn fire which sent 50 guests of the two hotels fleeing in sleeping attire. The most seriously burned were Sam Allard of Kirkland Lake, Ont., and A. J. H. Stevenson of Toronto.

Hull Calls German Envoy for Parley

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Secretary Hull called Ambassador Hans Dieckhoff to the state department today for a 15-minute conversation, which gave rise to reports that they had discussed the new measures against Jews in the Reich.

However, neither the state department nor the ambassador would discuss the talk.

Informed persons said Hull might have taken advantage of the meeting to express America's concern over the severity of the measures. These persons explained, however, that no formal protest was possible because the German decrees were of purely domestic concern.

Townsend Enjoys Election Results

CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Dr. Francis E. Townsend, old age pension advocate, said the elections last Tuesday gave his recovery movement its "greatest victory in history."

He issued a statement that: "I feel certain now that some definite action will be taken on the Townsend plan bill very early in the next session." He said that out of 240 candidates supported by the Townsend movement, 151 were elected.

91 Hurt in Train Crash

Grid Specials Hit in Yards At South Bend

Two Coaches Upset When Football Trains Meet on Sidetrack

More Than 100 Persons Caught Inside Tipped Over Coaches

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Nov. 12.—(AP)—Collision of two "Football Special" trains—each jammed with nearly 500 fans bound for the Notre Dame-Minnesota game injured 91 persons and shook up 950 others here today.

Field inspectors for the New York Central said the complete list of injured stood tonight at 91. Twenty of these were taken to the hospital for treatment.

The twelve coaches of the New York Central carried 492 passengers.

Those uninjured, after recovering from shock, hired taxicabs and private automobiles and hurried out to the game.

Two Coaches Tipped Over

The trains—New York Central and Grand Trunk—were not traveling fast, but the impact was sufficiently hard to topple over a bar coach and a passenger coach of the New York Central "special." Entrances to the overturned coaches were in such position that rescuers had to use step-ladders to get to the injured. More than 100 persons were in the upset coaches.

Witnesses said the Grand Trunk "special," going east on the main line a mile from the union station in the southwest part of the city, plowed into the New York Central "special," headed north on a sidetrack, just behind the New York Central's first coach.

Noise of the crash was heard for several blocks. Word of the accident spread like wildfire and drew thousands of persons to the area, complicating the work of rescue.

Fifteen ambulances which rushed to the injured to the hospital and St. Joseph hospitals had difficulty in getting through the heavy downtown traffic. The influx of some 55,000 persons for the football game created unusual snarls throughout the city.

Most of those aboard the trains were from Chicago and vicinity.

In response to an emergency call members of the South Bend Visiting Nurses' association hurried to the scene and aided in caring for those hurt.

The train crews declined to discuss responsibility for the accident.

A railroad man who asked that his name be withheld said air brakes of the Grand Trunk train apparently failed, and the train slid into the other "special."

Mexicans Agree To Pay for Land

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—(AP)—The state department disclosed tonight the Mexican government had agreed to make an initial payment of \$1,000,000 next May in settlement of claims for seized American farmland, and additional annual payments of not less than \$1,000,000 until all adjusted claims were paid.

The agreement was reached after a long controversy that threatened to impair relations between the two countries.

A joint two-man commission will begin work December 1 in Mexico City to adjudicate the claims of all Americans who have lost agrarian property since 1927 under Mexican expropriation laws.

It must complete the work by next May 31, and any claims unsettled then will be submitted to a third person who must reach a verdict within two months.

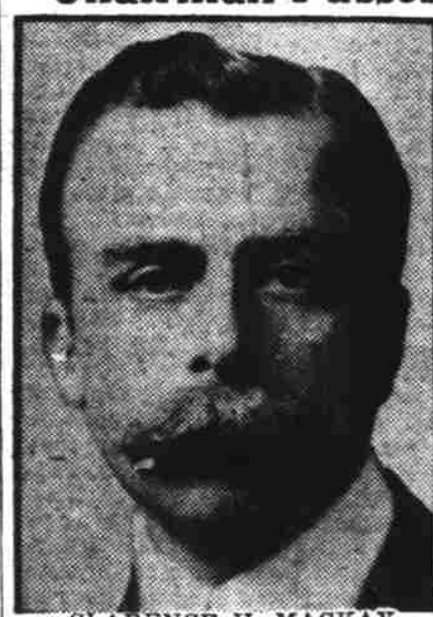
Flier Pokes Hole In Plane's Roof When Air Bounces

CLARENCE H. MACKAY Dies at Age 64

Cable System He Owned Was International in Scope

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Clarence H. Mackay, capitalist and chairman of the board of Postal Telegraph Cable company, died tonight at his home here. He was 64 years old.

From his father, John William Mackay, an Irish immigrant who joined the California gold rush of 1849 and founded a fortune on the famed Comstock lode, Mackay inherited control of a vast telegraph and cable system.

He eventually enlarged the system until its service covered approximately three-fourths of the distance around the earth.

He was married in 1898 to Katherine Duer, member of a prominent New York family, and they had two daughters and a son. One of the daughters, Elin, married Irving Berlin, the song writer.

Seventeen years after he and his first wife were divorced in 1914, Mackay married Anna Case, concert soprano. She survives him.

Three Are Hurt In Auto Mishap

ALBANY, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Three persons were hurt, one seriously, in a head-on collision of two automobiles and a rear-end collision of a third on the Albany-Corvallis highway three miles west of here, State Police Sergeant Ernest Larios said tonight.

Mrs. D. H. Bodine, bookkeeper of the WCTU children's home, suffered a compound fracture of the leg and a shattered wrist. A companion, Mrs. Gertrude Brunson, laundress at the home, was cut and bruised and Dick Hampton, passenger in the third car driven by Sam Looney, Jefferson, received a broken nose.

Larios was informed that Mrs. Bodine, traveling here, was followed by Looney when a machine driven by Paul Petri, Oregon State college music instructor, suddenly swung to her side to avoid hitting a bicycle. Petri and Looney were not hurt.

"Quick Change" Hogan Sets All Time Switching Record

PORTLAND, Nov. 12.—(AP)—The situation of Russell Hogan, the democratic party in Multnomah county and several other persons tonight gave promise of developing an all-time record of complications and contests.

Hogan was the democrat who was defeated Tuesday in a race for a tri-county state senate seat including Multnomah county. On Thursday he started political ranks by changing his registration to republican.

Bennett has said he would resign if the committee would recommend a liberal but he "wouldn't stand" for Hogan and he didn't think Beckman should have the job because he has one—county chairman.

County Court May Save Its Building Plans

Court Could Appropriate Sum in Limitation to Open Fund

Through More Budgeting Building Fund Could Be Established

Rising belief that Marion county's courthouse construction plans were upset at last Tuesday's election because of an incompletely informed electorate may lead the county court this week to take the one definite step toward salvaging the building program that remains open. That is appropriating as large a sum as possible, small though it will be, within the 6 per cent limitation when the final budget meeting is held Tuesday morning.

The budget committee estimates leave a \$4925.57 margin between appropriations and the tax maximum that can be assigned to the courthouse fund. When the court goes over the budget again, it may find savings in other items possible so that the building fund may be further increased.

Could Gradually Build Fund

From this small beginning the county could build a fund in coming years through repeated and substantially larger annual appropriations. Should the next congress make new federal aid appropriations, the county court could reconsider the advisability of putting a building tax up to the people once more.

No action short of a special election in mid-December and passage of a special tax levy apparently could place the county in a position to utilize a federal grant under the PWA appropriation act now in effect because the act provides that construction must be started before January 1, 1939.

No such election is likely to be called.

No Restriction as to Grant

The courthouse measure the voters did approve Tuesday does not restrict the court to use of a grant from any particular federal appropriation but specifies only that, in addition to securing federal assistance to the extent of approximately \$266,000, the county shall start work "December 31, 1938, or as soon thereafter as funds are available."

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"Dopey" Creator Accident Victim

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Injuries received in an automobile accident brought death today to E. E. Spencer, 34, creator of "Dopey," and chief animator of "Donald Duck" in Walt Disney's animated movies.

Spencer's car collided with one driven by Lou Ostrow, 47, producer of the Judge Hardy series of pictures, who received a brain concussion and lacerations. James Galtier, 34, a sound technician and Ostrow's passenger, suffered a brain concussion and back injuries, which may cause his death.

When Disney was in Kansas City in 1931 he saw posters of cows which Spencer had drawn from a livestock show and induced him to come to Hollywood. Spencer had been married but a year and is survived by his widow, Lee.

Boreas Drops in To Visit Valley

28 Is Minimum in Salem; Klamath's 12 Below Coldest in State

Salem shivered along with all the rest of the state yesterday as King Winter paid an advance visit here. For the second consecutive day the lowest reading here was 28, the maximum 42. More of the same kind was forecast for today and Monday.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 12.—(AP)—Snow flurries drifted through the Willamette valley today and all Oregon shivered in temperatures which dipped below zero at several points.

Portland, where tiny snowflakes fluttered intermittently all day, had its coldest day since February. Although the official reading was just at freezing, several sections reported 23 degrees above zero. A number of streets and roads were washed because of ice.

Temperatures sank to as low as 12 degrees below zero in the Klamath country. Klamath Falls' new seasonal minimum was 14 degrees above zero.

Highways were glazed in southern Oregon where the mercury went to 22 degrees above zero at Medford. All major highways in the area were open but road crews spread sand on sections of the Pacific highway, Crater lake highway and the Klamath-Medford route.

A two-foot snowfall in the Red Butte area gave Roseburg residents the first sipping of the year.

Mouse for Snake Food Turns out As Snake-Eater

Trio's Arrest Solves Series Of Burglaries

State Police Say Three Independence Youths Admit Deeds

Guns, Ammunition Taken by Thieves Recovered by Policemen

Roundup of three Independence youths yesterday led to the solution of nine store burglaries, three service station entries, four holdups and four car thefts committed in Marion, Polk and Benton counties in the last 60 days. Farley Mogan, state police sergeant, announced last night. Station and Independence city police assisted in the cleanup.

The trio, whom Mogan said had made full confessions, consisted of James Larsen, 21, and his brother, Clarence, 18, and James McKinnis, 19, a parolee from the state training school.

Will Charge Trio In Dallas Court

All three will be charged at Dallas with burglary of the George Cooper hardware store at Monmouth, from which \$150 worth of guns and several thousand rounds of ammunition were stolen the night of October 19, Mogan said.

James Larsen was taken to the Polk county jail, Clarence Larsen and McKinnis, who pleaded guilty in Stayton justice court yesterday to petty larceny, involving a service station entry there, and were sentenced by Judge Walter Bell to six months in jail and paroled to Severast Mogan, will be taken to Dallas Monday.

The youths admitted, the sergeant said, that in addition to breaking into stores they had held up three couples in parked automobiles near Monmouth, taking their money, and two women as they rode to work. One of the women, Francis Marion Waters, a 40-year-old farmer, from bad and attempted to rob him. Waters by a ruse got inside his house and shut the door in their faces.

Three Fled When Shot Fired

The trio were alleged by Mogan to have broken a window out of the Eola service station two weeks ago but to have fled when shot at by the operator, who had been asleep in the place.

The cleanup resulted in recovery of the guns and part of the ammunition taken from Monmouth and Independence hardware stores.
