Continue Over Grand Jurors

Investigation Is Before Body Which Is Better Served by Them

Circuit Judge L. H. McMahon yesterday continued over into the November term of court the grand jury which has served throughout the last two terms. The jury has before it certain investigations and public matters which for the best interests of the public should be carried on by the present body, the judge's order states.

The November term trial jury panel has not been called to meet at any definite time.

In justice court yesterday Charles Riley Cutsinger, charged with permitting an unlicensed operator to drive a motor vehicle, was given a six-months suspended jail sentence and placed on probation for one year. The operator in question, his son Clarence, was driving the car that collided recently with a motorcycle ridden by James Grant, injuring the latter fatally. Grant's sons urged leniency for Cutsinger.

Interstate UCC Payments Gain

Oregon Commission Pays Benefits to Former Residents Here

Multi-state operations of the state unemployment compensation commission rapidly are gaining sizeable proportions, a review of claims filed in the past two months discloses.

Amounts disbursed by Oregon to former residents now residing in other states jumped 100 per cent since September 3 and the number of claims, 67 per cent. Job insurance paid during October to former Oregonians now living in California exceeded that paid through 16 of the 22 employment offices in this state.

Oregon Pays \$45,115 to former residents, the picture is not entirely one-sided, according to Administrator D. A. Baumore. Oregon has determined 1016 multi-state claims eligible against its fund, but 1537 claims have been lodged in local offices in this state against unemployment compensation benefit funds of other states.

This means that an even larger amount of insurance may be returned to present residents of Oregon than this state has paid out to former Oregonians, the administrator explained.

California Leading
California tops both lists. Oregon's neighbor to the south is receiving unemployment compensation on 585 claims, which have taken \$30,545 away from the Oregon fund thus far, but former Californians now living in Oregon have filed 1262 claims against the Golden State. Sixty-one claims have been filed against Idaho and 39 against Minnesota. "Washington does not begin paying benefits until January 1 and thus far only one claim has been lodged against the northern neighbor."

However, 134 claims have been determined eligible for former Oregonians now residing in Washington, with 80 oked for by Idahoans.

Multi-state payments of unemployment compensation were made possible by a reciprocal agreement by 43 states. Oregon was one of the first to begin processing this type of claims.
