### Four Injured in Woodburn Mishap

**Victor Duffee Seriously Hurt; Accident Third Since Thursday**

WOODBURN—The third automobile accident since early Thursday afternoon occurred near Woodburn Sunday night shortly before 9 o'clock when G. Borgerson and Larry Wick, both of Seattle, and Victor Duffee and Joe Murphy both of Woodburn, were injured in a crash at the intersection of South Front street on-off and the Pacific highway.

The first of this series of three accidents was a head-on collision early Thursday afternoon three miles south of town on the highway in which Stephen Hodge, Kelso, Wash., Mrs. Lester Coggins, Portland, and Mrs. Cora Coggins, Salem, were injured.

The second accident, Saturday night, claimed two lives: Marshall William "Billy" Kitchen and Glen Nash, both of Salem.

In the Sunday accident Wick was proceeding south on the highway with Borgerson as a passenger in his machine while the other machine, driven by Duffee with Murphy as a passenger, was going north. The machines collided almost head-on.

The Beecher-O'Hair ambulance removed all four to the Woodburn hospital where Duffee pronounced as the most seriously injured, was treated for severely lacerated face and hands. Both Borgerson and Wick received cuts about the left leg while Murphy was badly cut on the hands. Both machines were damaged considerably.
