

Johnson Firm Gets Contract

Cast Iron Pipe to Be Used for Water System; Woman Injured

LEBANON—The Johnson Construction company of Vancouver, Wash., awarded the contract for the grade school building of Sweet Home has also received the contract for its water system. Each company bidding gave a bid for cast iron pipe, for heavy steel pipe and for light steel pipe. The contract was awarded on cast iron pipe, the best and also most expensive. The Johnson company's bid was \$64,590.81. The other bids ranged from the quoted figure to \$80,912.75, the latter figure by the United Construction company of Portland. Work will begin November 25.

With the prune growers of Oregon facing a surplus condition which is forcing stern and sincere attention as to the marketing end, Louise Hurmer of Carlton, chairman of the prune growers stabilization committee of Oregon, has formed a stabilization committee which has appealed to the National Association of Food Chains and other sources of distribution, to make an extra effort to move the surplus of Oregon prunes. As a result, November 19 to 26, inclusive, is designated as "prune week" in Oregon.
