### Rosser Argument Is up Saturday

DALLAS—Arguments on the state's motion to vacate appeal of the Al Rosser case to the supreme court will be held before Judge Arle G. Walker in circuit court here Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. Rosser is former head of the teamster union in Oregon.

The question arose when Rosser believed he was about to be released on bail. The state declared to the court that Rosser's attorneys had failed to perfect appeal from within 30 days of time the notice of appeal to the supreme court was filed.

On this basis the state contended Rosser forfeited right to appeal and so the court had not authority to admit him to bail. Rosser was found guilty by a jury and sentenced to 12 years in prison, from which sentence the notice of appeal was started.
