First License Here—Claims of other counties to having issued the first license under the new marriage examination law which went into effect last Thursday were disputed at the county clerk's office yesterday. It was pointed out that Clerk U. G. Boyer of Marion county received an application for a license subject to the new act last Thursday and issued it last Monday. Although two licenses have been issued since the act went into effect, Boyer said his records showed only four were given in the first week of December a year ago, indicating that the new law may not be the cause for the present scarcity of marriage licenses applicants.

Capitola Question Up—The district boundary board yesterday took under advisement a petition for annexation of the remainder of Capitola addition to the Salem school district after hearing but one resident in favor of the change. No opposition appeared. Before giving its decision the board will await statements from the Hayesville and Salem school boards as to whether or not they favor the transfer, which involves but a small section of land.

Answer by Kurth Seeks Judgment

P. N. Kurth, stockholder in the Salem By-Products company recently placed in receivership at the suit of M. T. Moisan, also a shareholder, filed his answer in circuit court yesterday to Moisan's complaint and asked for \$2000 judgment against him on a stock sale contract.

Kurth alleged that on August 9 he transferred 100 shares of stock to Moisan for \$500 cash, \$2000 in deferred payments and an agreement whereby Kurth was to be retained by the company as foreman at \$100 a month plus 20 per cent of the net profits earned. He claims the agreement has not been fully executed.

Political History Honors Kerr



The first copy of the new pictorial history of Oregon State college, "Orange and Black," recently published by the OSC Alumni association in commemoration of the 70th anniversary of the founding of the college, was presented to Dr. William Jasper Kerr by George Kautzen of Portland, president of the alumni association. The presentation was a homecoming feature at the college, at which the sculptured plaque of Dr. Kerr, shown in the insert, was dedicated, after being placed over the fireplace in the Memorial Union building by the class of 1908.

Marijuana Peril Told to Kiwanis

Marijuana, narcotic which deadens inhibitory brain centers and induces amnesia and hallucinations with the result that its use is responsible for otherwise incredible crimes, is rapidly acquiring new victims in the United States since its introduction a few years ago from Mexico, members of the Salem Kiwanis club were told Tuesday at their weekly luncheon by Mrs. Dorothy Fleisher. She quoted authorities to the effect that marijuana was "a greater menace than war."

One of the difficulties is the common occurrence of the hemp plant from which marijuana is taken, the speaker explained. Ten thousand acres are cultivated in the United States for legitimate purposes. A few of the plants have been found growing

wild in the Salem vicinity. Last year federal agents seized 26,000 tons of marijuana, enough to make several billion cigarettes. Because of the difficulty of stamping out the supply, education must be the principle means of combating this evil, the speaker asserted.

1939 License Tag Demand Is Heavy

A total of 28,513 automobile license plates for the year 1939 have been issued by the state department, Secretary of State Snell reported Wednesday. This is 839 more than on the same date a year ago.

First 1939 plates will be mailed December 13, Secretary of State Snell said. Next year's plates may be placed on cars December 15. The 1939 plates have a black background and yellow numerals.

Salem public school enrollment continues to increase, with a growth of 53 registered for the last six weeks period, October 2, to December 5, according to registration figures as of yesterday. The increase for the year, from December, 1937, to December, 1938, is 236, 205 of which has been in senior high school where the enrollment now is 1894 and expected to reach 1900 before the term ends.
