Governor Martin Invites Grocer To Sit in His "Expensive" Chair As Result Letter on Furnishings

INDEPENDENCE—Governor Charles H. Martin, though busy with the affairs of state, took time to respond to a letter written by Thomas Smith, local grocery manager, after Smith read the Independence Enterprise account of expensive furniture in the governor's office. Smith wrote more in light than serious vein. But here is what the governor replied:

"I read with much interest your letter of November 30 regarding the furniture purchased for the capitol. I had no more to do with it than you did, my friend. I have just as high a regard for the taxpayers' money as you have.

"The expenditure for furniture in the capitol was a matter entirely within the jurisdiction of the capitol reconstruction commission over which I have no control. The commission was created by the legislature which body appointed six of the nine commissioners. At the time, I urged that the appointment be

made under the sole jurisdiction of the governor so that effective centralized control could be obtained. However, the legislature did not do so.

"You are welcome to come and sit in the chair mentioned in your letter. In fact, it is your privilege to sit in any and all of the chairs in the executive office.
