"I read with much interest your letter of November 30 regarding the furniture purchased for the capitol. I had no more to do with it than you did, my friend. I have just as high a regard for the taxpayers' money as you have.

The expenditure for furniture in the capitol was a matter entirely within the jurisdiction of the capitol reconstruction commission over which I have no control. The commission was created by the legislature which body appointed six of the nine commissioners. At the time, I urged that the oppointment be

made under the sole jurisdiction of the governor so that effective centralized control could be obtained. However, the legislature did not do so.


