Seventh Well Started—Drilling of the seventh well on Stayton island, where the Salem water department is seeking to increase the city water supply, is now under way and work on the eighth and perhaps the last will be started in the near future, Manager Cuyler VanPatten said yesterday. Pumps will be set on the test holes as soon as possible, probably early next week, to ascertain definitely if additional water is available underground. VanPatten said the testing period might be prolonged in order to operate the pumps at winter low-stages of the North Santiam river to determine to what extent if any the stream's level affects the level of the underground water on the island.

Sparhawk Gets \$313 Judgment

Poult Brooding Case Is Scheduled for Trial This Morning

Circuit Judge L. G. Lewelling yesterday ruled in favor of Percy E. Sparhawk in a suit against Sidney L. Stevens and others but cut \$40.50 from the plaintiff's total claim for labor and materials in altering a house and allowed the defendants a \$64.93 offset. Total amount for which the court gave Sparhawk was \$313.45 in addition to \$75 attorney fees and court costs.

The suit of Clarence O. Davis against A. B. Hinz and Frank Wied, involving a contract for brooding poult, is scheduled to go on trial in department one before Circuit Judge C. H. Hendricks at 9 o'clock this morning.

To the claim of Davis that \$660.17 is owing on a \$1981.50 bill for brooding 3963 poult in the spring of 1937, the defendants yesterday answered with the assertion that they had sold him 6241 poult at 35 cents each, agreed to buy back all the number one poult after seven weeks at 55 cents each and that they fully performed their agreement, taking 3963 poult for a total of \$338.55.

Walnut Challenge Quickly Answered

Mrs. J. H. Wright States Tree Produced 1533 Pounds in Year

Clyde LaFollette's challenge to walnut growers to produce a tree that has yielded more than 800 pounds, dried, met a quick response, and it looks today like Mrs. J. H. Wright who lives on the Wallace road in Polk county takes the honors.

Mrs. Wright says one huge walnut tree in front of the family home produced 1533 pounds of nuts as they came from the tree, or 1150 pounds, dried basis. The walnuts, Mayettes grafted to black walnuts some years ago, were kept separate at harvest time, and filled 25 gunny sacks.

Will Keep Tab
"The tree was so loaded with nuts that we decided to keep a close tab on its production this fall," Mrs. Wright says. She added the tree draws water from an old dug well, which may have something to do with the phenomenal crop. The tree is 24 inches around two from the ground.

However, in the 1937 season, there was scarcely a gallon of nuts on the tree, Mrs. Wright said.

Mrs. Wright has sold the crop from the heavy producer at the home, getting between 9 and 10 cents a pound, which means around \$100 worth of nuts in the tree this past season.
