**Monday's Package Mailing Is Easily Highest of Any Single Day**

The Salem postoffice crew, from postmaster on down, had a bit of a breathing spell yesterday over Monday's great rush, but even so there was a continuous flow of packages and letters into the office yesterday. Monday's mailing easily put up an all time record for packages, with nearly two full carloads shipped out Monday for northern and eastern points alone. Letters going through Monday checked off \$9,000 on the metre machine, but this is not a record for the office, as last year around 100,000 letters and cards were worked through in a single day. The peak of letter mailing will likely come today or tomorrow.
