Modern hams are cured differently than they were in the last generation, packers preparing the cure so mild that it seems unnecessary to remove any of the good flavor by boiling.

In baking a whole ham it is important that the oven temperature be low. An oven temperature of 300 degrees is recommended for best results. Place the ham, fat side up, on a rack in an open roasting pan, and let bake at the low temperature until done. About 45 minutes before serving. remove the ham from the oven and remove the rind, if this was finish baking and brown.
