# Tree, Gifts Feature Christmas Program By Saver's School

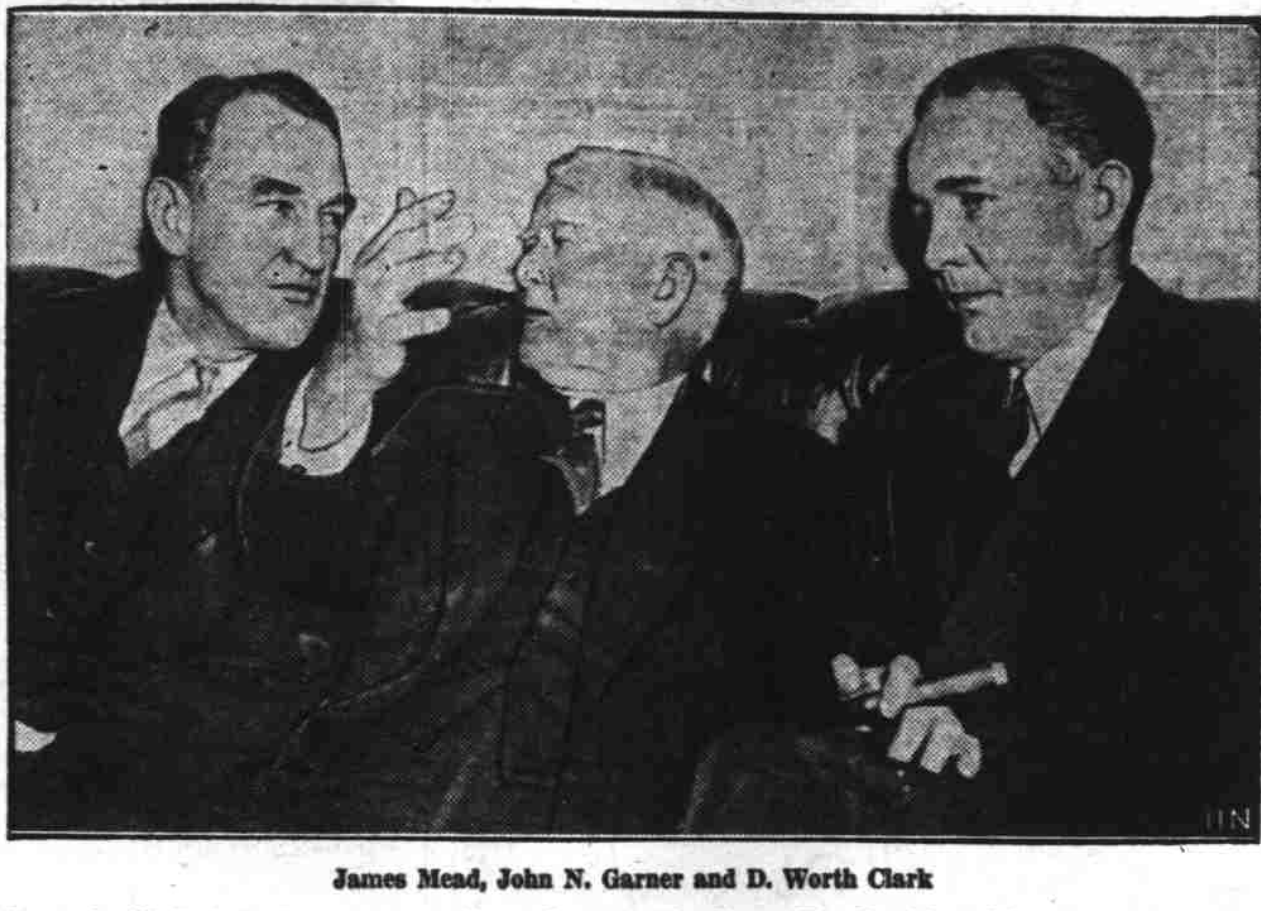

# Mangas Gets Willamina Job

### Low bid of \$75,540 About \$5000 Under Highest School Proposal

WILLAMINA—Construction is slated to start this week on the new union high school building here for district No. 7, following award of the bid to George E. Mangas at a figure of \$75,540.

Mangas's bid was the lowest of six submitted to the board, the others being: H. A. Sittrengren company, \$77,600; Quinn construction company, \$76,900; Power and Kallaway, \$80,362; Cherveney and Reverman, \$77,820; Portland Construction company, \$79,879.

Plans drawn by C. N. Freeman, Portland architect, call for a one-story brick veneer entirely modern structure.

Besides class rooms, the school will contain home economics department, a combination of gymnasium and auditorium which the entire community will use as a central meeting place and a separate agricultural shop for Smith-Hughes vocational education.

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# Mt. Angel Creamery Sets Example For Rest of State, Governor-Elect Tells Patrons at Annual Festivity

MT. ANGEL, Dec. 28.—(Special)—Old fashioned principles of business plus modern methods of manufacturing and promotion have made for the Mt. Angel cooperative creamery a record that is something for the rest of the state to shoot at, Governor-elect Charles A. Sprague told patrons of the creamery, gathered here Wednesday in the annual patrons' dinner, which will be repeated Thursday for the second half of the membership.

The governor-elect declared that the successful business enterprise must be operated on simple lines, with progressive methods, but without an overhead that crushes and burdens.

"It is my hope to guide four years along these same lines you have employed, using the old fashioned virtues plus modern methods," he told the crowd of nearly 250 persons.

Father Alcuius was the other main speaker of the afternoon, giving an interesting address on European conditions as he found them on his recent travels abroad, especially Germany.

Need to Move Surplus  
Necessity for some action to move the increased volume of dairy products was declared by three of the morning speakers, Prof. P. M. Brandt of Oregon State college, President R. J. Eberling and Manager Frank Hettwer of the cooperative creamery.

Manager Hettwer suggested legislation setting an excise tax to raise funds to advertise creamery products as in other states. A standing vote on his proposal showed a great majority favorable to such an excise tax.

Dairymen are not using enough pressure to keep dairy products before the people and before the government, Prof. Brandt said. The federal agricultural program of increasing forage products has made dairy feed cheaper, resulting in increased production of dairy products, thus helping to create the present problem, he holds.

President Berning, in his annual address, said the co-op added 533 members in the first 11 months of 1938, bringing the membership to over 2200 and to a point where boundaries must be set. In the year, Albany-Lebanon dairymen came in, only on program, that they furnish their own hauling, and dairymen near Corvallis are asking to come in on the same basis.

Butter volume of the co-op, ending its 26th year, increased 12 per cent or 889,012 pounds in the first 11 months of 1938, Berning said, but the large market surplus pulled the average price per pound in the first 11 months 7 cents under last year, or a total loss of \$130,072.39 to the members over the 1937 market average.

The Mt. Angel academy choir and a trio, Mrs. Al Cbroeder, Pauline B. Saffield and Eustelle Benham, accompanied by Rozella Blem, furnished musical features.
