GATES—Mrs. Thompson passed away at Gates Friday morning December 31 at the age of 77 years.

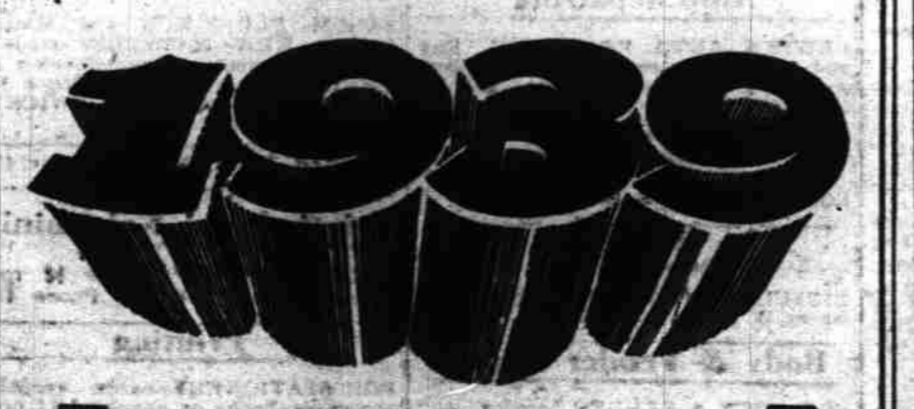
Her death came unexpectedly as she was in good health.
