Farmer Union Plans Hospital

Association Would Build \$80,000 Structure as Headquarters

Incorporation plans for the Oregon Farmers Union Cooperative Hospital association, whose headquarters will be in Salem, were approved at a meeting here yesterday and tentative plans for a \$75,000 to \$80,000 three-story hospital building studied. Articles of incorporation will be filed in the near future, Herman E. Lafky, Farmers Union adviser, said.

The cooperative hospital will be located nearest to a majority of the association's members. To date sites in Salem, Mt. Angel and McMinnville have been considered.

Officers of the association are S. Hamrick, Salem, president; Eben Ray, Willamina, secretary-treasurer, and directors, Harley Libby, Jefferson; W. L. Chambers, Linn county; Dr. Edgar S. Fortner, Salem; Joseph Bernat, Mt. Angel; Ernest Werner, Silverton; John Plass, Hillsboro, and Peter Zimmerman, Yamhill.

The articles of incorporation will empower the association to contract with physicians, surgeons, dentists and nurses for services to its members at reduced cost, patients may be accepted at the projected hospital, but at the prevailing rates, Lafky said.

Plans for the proposed building were drawn by F. H. Struble, Salem architect.
