

Testimony of Hooker Heard

Polk Sheriff Says Alleged Shortage Result of Turnover Error

DALLAS, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Testimony in the trial of Sheriff T. B. Hooker, indicted 15 months ago by the grand jury for larceny of public funds, came to an abrupt close shortly after 2:30 o'clock this afternoon as the sheriff himself left the witness stand.

Following a consultation between court and counsel, Judge R. Frank Peters of Hillsboro, who is hearing the case, announced to the jury that attorneys had waived argument but that instructions would not be given to the jury until 9:30 o'clock Friday morning, until which time jurors were released.

Only three witnesses were called in the case. They were Floyd C.

Bowers, who made the audit, Miss Edna Pitzer, deputy in the office of County Clerk Graves, and Sheriff Hooker.

Sheriff Hooker testified that the alleged shortage, which throughout the trial was handled in general terms, was the result of an oversight in making a transfer to the county treasurer. He said his office did not have enough assistants to make turn-overs weekly during the rush time of tax payments. He testified that no complaints had ever been made on the yearly audits until a new system of handling the funds was set up last year. He also said he had never paid a penny one way or the other after an audit was completed.

Oscar Hayter is attorney for Sheriff Hooker and the prosecution is directed by Francis T. Wade of the attorney general's office, with District Attorney Spaulding sitting in with Wade at counsel table.

A lengthy stipulation filed in the case just before the trial opened Wednesday assisted materially in cutting down the actual trial time.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—(AP)—President and Mrs. Roosevelt held their reception honoring the justices of the supreme court tonight. Not all the justices attended, however.

Justice McReynolds' home said he had not been to the White House reception "for some time" and probably would not attend. Justice and Mrs. Brandeis almost never go out at night. Justice and Mrs. Butler did not arrange to go because Mrs. Butler was not feeling well.

The reception marked the first appearance in the "cabinet line" of Frank Murphy, appointed to succeed Homer Cummings as attorney general. Another new cabinet member, Secretary of Com-

Night Doings at Deadman's, or Why One Portland Reporter Would Just As Lief Stay Away From Funerals

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 5.—(AP)—Skeptical Portlanders sniffed suspiciously, policemen suspected a hoax, and even the newspaper reporter who "covered" the story wasn't sure it was on the level—but nevertheless the Multnomah county grand jury today studied grave robbery that occurred Wednesday night under circumstances that looked almost too dramatic to be real.

Early in the week Richard Scholz, reporter-photographer, received an anonymous telephone tip that a grave was to be robbed in Greenwood cemetery's potters' field.

Came to Country At Age of 12 The appointment brings to the nation's highest tribunal a man born 86 years ago in the Vienna of the Hapsburgs, who came to this country 12 years later, with his Jewish parents, knowing no word of English, and who a dozen years afterward was graduated from Harvard law school with highest honors.

With brief interludes of public service he has devoted himself mostly to an academic career. He has written much upon the law and upon the duties and responsibilities of the court upon which he is now to sit.

His activities have made him the object of many attacks. Theodore Roosevelt called him a "red" in 1917 when he espoused the cause of Tom Mooney in making a report to President Wilson. The Daughters of the American Revolution and other patriotic organizations denounced him because he insisted in 1927 that Sacco and Vanzetti were innocent.

Rep. Thomas (R-NJ) a member of the house committee on un-American activities, said today he could not "conceive of a worse appointment." He asserted that evidence taken by the committee showed Frankfurter was a member of "various radical organizations" and that Mr. Roosevelt "might as well have appointed Earl Browder." Browder is secretary of the communist party.

To the numerous attacks upon Frankfurter as a "radical," his supporters have replied that he advocates the democratic form of government and the American constitutional system.

Scholz told his story to the grand jury today and District Attorney James Bain said he would ask the grand jury to return John Doe indictments against the grave robbers and the "lone stranger."

"If we learn the identity of the three we will prosecute them for violating a state law, conviction for which carries a penitentiary sentence," Bain said.

The grand jury with officers and Scholz visited the cemetery today where the open grave was viewed. The two had removed the earth down to a casket bearing a body buried on December 24.

Report Lindbergh Gives Air Survey

Confidential Report Is Held Given President on Nazi Forces

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Authoritative sources said tonight that Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, who recently made an air tour of Germany, had given the administration a confidential report on the air strength of the reich.

The administration, after long study, submitted to congress today the outlines of a new \$1,600,000,000 armament program. Military officials expect the program to encompass recommendations for many new warplanes.

While army officials declined to confirm the report of the Lindbergh communication, they said that the flier remained a member of the air corps reserve of this country despite his long residence in Europe.

It also was recalled that he is a member of the national advisory committee on aeronautics, a governmental agency which has headquarters at the navy department building here. Lindbergh attended a meeting of that committee about a year ago, leaving soon after to return to Europe.

Lindbergh has made two trips into Germany in recent years, the first in 1937.

On his latest visit—part of an aerial jaunt about Europe—he visited a number of important aviation fields and factories in the reich.

Car Ferry Sticks In Lake Michigan

ST. IGNACE, Mich., Jan. 5.—(AP)—The \$22-foot railway car ferry Chief Wawatam, its coal supply running low, remained hard aground tonight after the parting of a three-inch cable frustrated attempts to pull it off North Graham shoals, a mile offshore in the Straits of Mackinac.

The Wawatam, with a crew of 33, ran aground in a blizzard Tuesday as it attempted to ferry 12 loaded and 10 empty freight cars across the straits from Mackinaw City, tip of Michigan's lower peninsula, seven miles away. If the vessel is not freed tomorrow, attempts will be made to transport coal from St. Ignace to the Wawatam's bunkers.
