

# Silverton's First Woman Mayor Will Be Seated Monday Night

## Mrs. Schlador Knows Town

### Few Changes Are Expected When Appointments Are Announced

SILVERTON—Mayor Zetta, known also as Mrs. J. C. Schlador, will be sworn into office Monday night as Silverton's first woman mayor. She knows almost all about Silverton. She was born Zetta White, near Silverton, and was graduated from the Silverton high school. For some time she was chief operator for the Interurban Telephone company at Silverton. For the past few years she has owned and operated a fashion shop here. Two years ago she was president of the Silverton chamber of commerce.

Mayor Wilber Moffatt, retiring, will open the council session Monday night at 7:30 to finish all old business before turning over the business of the city to Mayor Schlador. Mrs. Schlador will make a number of appointments. Whether or not those now holding appointive offices will be released in favor of others has furnished considerable conjecture during the past two weeks. It is thought likely that few changes, if any, will be made.

**Appointment Due**

However, it is in Mrs. Schlador's power to appoint two police officers, the chief of police, now Omar Halverson, and the night officer, now Harry Wheeler. She may also suggest a substitute officer during off-days for the regulars.

Other appointive offices are those held by Rex Albright, city attorney; Roy Morley, secretary of the water commission; Life Yates, street commissioner; Dr. P. A. Loar, city health officer; the athletic commission, W. L. McGinnis, Guy DeLay, J. H. McCullough, L. C. Eastman and E. J. McCall.

Mayor Schlador answers to inquiries that she will make no advance statements but will endeavor to deal with matters to the best of her ability as they come before her and her council.

Silverton will also have three new councilmen. L. F. Tucker, present fire chief; R. A. Fish and Al Coote, cut-going councilmen are Otto Legard, Hugh Range and W. L. McGinnis, George Hubbe, city recorder, were re-elected. Councilmen held over are A. W. Green, John Porter and C. B. Anderson.

The council voted at their meeting to purchase a new fire truck for the city. The money for the purchase was authorized by a recent vote of the people of Dallas.

## Scheelar Presents Mt. Angel Museum Valuable Collection Mounted Animals

MT. ANGEL—The museum of Mt. Angel college has recently been enriched with a valuable collection of mounted animal specimens, donated by A. A. Scheelar of Salem. The collection represents many years work and comprises local wild life and freak specimens, besides large snakes and big game imported from South America and other countries. As Mr. Scheelar is himself a sportsman and hunter, many of the big game animals from the United States and Canada were brought down by his rifle.

Two years ago Mr. Scheelar gave the Monastery a large assortment of mounted animals which made it necessary to enlarge the museum. His latest gift more than doubles the number of large animal specimens on the hilltop and is valued at several thousand dollars.

The present college museum is little more than 10 years old, the original collections having been destroyed in the fire of 1926 that destroyed the entire institution. With the help of such benefactors as Mr. Scheelar a remarkably fine museum has been built up in the short time elapsing since the rebuilding of the monastery and school.

## C. B. Smiths Goldenweds

### Quiet Observance Is Slated Sunday Afternoon at Jefferson Home

JEFFERSON—Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Smith will celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary Sunday, Jan. 8. They expect their three sons home for the occasion, but owing to ill health of both, they will not hold open house to their many friends.

The sons are Arthur of Portland, Thomas of Independence and Homer of Jefferson.

Mary E. Hutchins was married at Astoria, Ore., to C. B. Smith January 8, 1889, by Rev. Leroy of the Astoria Baptist church. They made their home there for seven years, where Mr. Smith had a wholesale and retail confectionery business. Here, their three sons, Arthur, Thomas and Homer were born. They next moved to Nes Perce, Idaho, where Mr. Smith engaged in stock raising.

To Jefferson in 1907 They lived in Grants Pass for seven years, where he engaged in the paint and roof work contracting business, coming to Jefferson in 1907; moving to a ranch on the Santiam river in the Talbot district. Later they moved to the Bill Anderson farm, and from there to Independence where Mr. Smith was engaged in the furniture and real estate business for 18 years.

Their next move was to Newberg, and five years later, with their son, Homer, traded their Newberg property for the farm near Marion. They lived there until Mrs. Smith's failing health compelled them to move to Jefferson in 1926.

Mrs. Smith is 84 years old, having been born April 22, 1855, at Ashland, Ky. Mr. Smith, 78, was born at Hastings, Minn., April 22, 1861.

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## Peculiar Explosion in Tumblers Of Laundry at Silverton Causes Damage to Equipment, Building

SILVERTON—An explosion in the Silverton laundry and two fires following closely one upon the other, furnished considerable excitement in downtown Silverton Friday morning.

The explosion took place in the Troy dry room tumbler around 9 o'clock, shortly after Carl Stamey, laundry proprietor, had started the tumbler. One door was blown completely off the hinges, another was shattered and glass from broken windows at the front of the laundry was blown nearly 150 feet away. Coveralls and overcoats and overalls in the machine were scattered widely.

Mr. Stamey and Mrs. J. O. Taylor, an employe, both of whom were working in the room, were unharmed although both were somewhat stunned from the shock. Clifford Lovett, in a rear room, reported the shock shook him up somewhat.

The cause of the explosion was not determined. The tumbler is run by steam and has been in use for about nine years. Its capacity is approximately 1000 pounds a day.

Some insurance partially covered the damage. The fire department had barely returned from the laundry fire when its members were called out to a chimney fire at the Ed Johnson home at 222 Kent street. The house is owned by Hans Hansen, now in California. No damage was done.

The third fire occurred in a rubbish pile in the woodshed of the Robert Adams house at 612 N. First. Very little damage was done.

## Deadline Near for New ACA Signers

### First Checks on 1938 Farm Program Expected in Next Two Weeks

DALLAS—New signers under the 1938 agricultural conservation program should hurry to list their farms if they have not already done so, states W. C. Leth, Folk county agent. The middle of January has been set as the deadline for accepting new signers, and it is important that anyone who cares to should contact the county agent's office prior to that time.

Farms which have been listed in the conservation programs in 1938 or before are automatically included in the 1939 program and therefore it is not necessary for those farms already signed up to be listed again in 1939.

The first applications for payment in connection with the 1938 program were received this week at the office of the county agent. Checks should be forthcoming on these first applications within the next 10 days or two weeks. It is expected that checks will be coming more or less regularly from that time on.

Farmers will not receive checks until they receive notification from the county agent's office to appear there to sign application forms. These application forms are prepared in the state office at Corvallis and therefore cannot be signed until they are received from there. Notification is sent each person as soon as his application is received.
