For the past few years she has own-ed and operated a fashion shop here. Two years ago she was president of the Silverton chamber of commerce.

Mayor Wilber Moffatt, retiring, will open the council session Monday night at 7:30 to finish all old business before turning over the business of the city to Mayor Schlador. Mrs. Schlador will make a number of appointments. Whether or not those now holding appointive offices will be released in favor of others has furnished considerable conjecture during the past two weeks.
