

Historic Dallas Academy Making Way for High School Addition

Men Start to Raze Building

Old Part of Present High School Originally Was La Creole School

DALLAS—Work was started here this week in tearing down the old part of the Dallas high school building to make way for the new addition to the school. The part now being demolished was originally the building used by LaCreole academy and Dallas college. After the college was discontinued the upper part of the building was refurnished to conform with the exterior of the new.

Growth Necessitates Change When the present senior high school was erected it was planned that in time this old part would be torn down and an additional wing added. If an increase in the enrollment made it necessary. During the past years the enrollment has increased very rapidly and more classrooms became imperative.

A bond issue for the erection of the new wing to the high school was carried at a recent election, and bids called for by the Dallas school board. Bal-burg and Odom of Salem were the lowest bidders and were awarded the contract.

Although preliminary work was started some time ago, the raising of historic LaCreole academy got underway this week.
