Mr. Harold Hawk, whose Salem high basketball team do their best when rated underdogs, came through with a convincing 36 to 9 win over a highly-favored Medford quintet here last night.

The visiting Pearpickers had won six straight this season until their meeting with the local prep. But it was quite evident Russ Atcheson's team had had very little, if any, experience against a zone defense.

Three for Medford
Medford collected the slim total of exactly three field goals, despite a very busy evening of casting off.

Salem had only slightly better luck hitting the basket in the first half, on field shots and free throws alike.

Medford jumped into a first-minute lead on a free throw by Newland, but Sebern dribbled in to sink a crippler and Gosser added a free throw for Salem.

Medford went ahead again as Newland made good another gift shot and Atcheson's team added a free throw for Salem.

Salem Takes Lead
That was the last time the visitors were in the ball game. Sebern caged a crippler and Quackenbush one from the edge of the foul circle, to give Salem a 7-4 lead.

Two free throws and another crippler by Sebern was the only scoring in the second period, and at the intermission it was 11-4, Salem.

Medford held the edge in the third period, closing the gap to 15-9, but Frankie Page tossed in three field goals and a free throw in the final period, to cinch it.

Spokane Battler Back to Fighting

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Tiger Jack Fox of Spokane, Wash., light-heavyweight boxer whose career was believed to have come to an abrupt end a month ago, came back as a world title contender today.

Fox and Melio Bettina of Beacon, N.Y., were matched for a 15-round bout at the Hippodrome February 17. The winner will be recognized as champion by the New York athletic commission, which has withdrawn title recognition from John Henry Lewis.

Fox was severely wounded December 9 when he was stabbed below the heart in a fight in a New York hotel. He was weak from loss of blood when he was found and was on the hospital danger list for several days. At the time it was believed the wound might end his career as a boxer, but he has recovered rapidly and after an examination a few days ago he was given permission to resume light training.

Cougars Crush Ducks 39 to 34

Slate Is Even At Series End

Pullman Club Grabs Lead in First Half, Retains It All Way in

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 7.—(AP)—Washington State college's light cavalry, led by a sophomore flash named Bud Olson, outran and outplayed the University of Oregon's tall basketball team here tonight to win going away. The score was Washington State 39, Oregon 34.

The victory evened the slate between the two institutions.

The Cougars, off to a slow start, rallied after the first five minutes of the first half to overtake a slight Oregon lead. They quickly ran up a three-point advantage, only to see the Webfoots come storming back to tie the game up and then go ahead again by a score of 10 to 9. The Oregon lead was short lived, however, and with Olson leading the way, Washington State took a lead they never relinquished during the remainder of the game.

The halftime score favored the Cougars, 14 to 10.

Ducks Make Stand
In the second half the Ducks, defending northern division champions, made a gallant attempt to overtake the fast-traveling Cougars. Three times they came within three points of the Pullman team, but each time Olson or Peto Hooper would sink their rally with long field baskets. Olson, his eye unerring from the key-hole position, sank 16 points for the Cougars' high scoring honors.

The Webfoots repeatedly fouled the Cougars during the last four minutes in desperate attempts to get the ball away from the time-stalling Washington State team.

For the second evening in a row the Cougars' ace forward, John Kosich, held Oregon's touted Laddie Gale, last year's high scorer for the division, to a mere five points—three foul tosses and a field goal.

Ready for Joe

Hands up, Pants off the Floor Is Motto for Louis Challenger

SUMMIT, N.J. Jan. 7.—(AP)—Way back when John Henry Lewis was just a little shaver around Phoenix, Ariz., his father handed him a theory which he expects will win him the world heavyweight championship from Joe Louis on January 26.

"John Henry," pappy advised, "if you want to get somewhere fighting, always hold your hands up, throw punches and keep the seat of your pants off the floor."

That's just the plan John Henry figures on using against the Brown Bomber when they tangle in Madison Square Garden's ring. Of course, this particular system will be mixed with a liberal quantity of applied science—the boys in the business call it brains or "noodle"—and a whole flock of right hands.

Right for Joe

Although he isn't talking much about it, John Henry's training sessions here at Madame Bey's camp in the Jersey Hills indicate he's going to fight right-hand shots at Joe all evening. As Max Schmeling once did, John Henry apparently "sees something" in the Louis armor.

It's a neat punch, too, when it works, that Lewis right hand. He snaps it straight off his shoulder with an overhead delivery and you're reminded of an airplane landing when it whips across. He's giving his sparring large doses of that blow daily, and when he finishes with them he keeps right on practicing it until the harmless little light bag howls for mercy.

John Henry is confident he can whip jolting Joe. He's expecting the fight to go the distance with Mr. Louis from Detroit abdicating in favor of Mr. Lewis from Phoenix when the 15 rounds are over. Lewis is so confident, in fact, that he has about decided to give up the light-heavyweight championship (he's recognized everywhere but in New York) for keeps.

"What's the use of having two titles?" he says. "One's enough for anybody. And the heavyweight one is enough for me."

About the brains-roll, John Henry won't go into that, but others around the camp will. Take George Gunther, a little negro who admits to 65 years and spent 34 of them in the ring. During that time, from 1899 to 1933, he had 417 fights, among them bouts with Jack Blackburn and Joe Gans.

"Well, sir," says George, "you know why John Henry's got a good chance? This is why" and he taps his forehead. "He thinks faster in the ring than Joe does. And he'll be smarter in the fighting."

Then there's Larry Amity, who's training John Henry and who worked with Joe for more than a year. He insisted John Henry can do it because he's the better boxer and ring general.

That sounds all well and good. John Henry, but maybe Joe'll have something to say about it.

Merger Rumored For NW Circuit

CHENAY, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Rumors of the possible consolidation of the Northwest conference and the Washington Intercollegiate conference into an eight school single conference were receiving strong attention at Eastern Washington college this weekend.

The possibility was hinged to the announcement of athletic officials that Eastern Washington college, a Washington conference member, and College of Puget Sound, of Northwest conference, had signed for three football games and that UPS had contracted home and home games for 1933-34 with the other three Washington conference teams.

The Cheney-Puget Sound games will be played here in 1933 and 1934 and at Tacoma in 1941.

Huskies Take 2nd Over Idaho Quint

SEATTLE, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Washington made a clean sweep of its basketball series with the University of Idaho tonight by winning, 51 to 25, before 5,000 fans. Last night the Huskies won, 34 to 23.

Washington led 22 to 9 at the half.

The victory sent the Huskies into the northern division, Pacific coast conference lead as Oregon lost to Washington State college, 33 to 34, at Eugene, Ore.

Washington State took over second place in the standings with three victories and one defeat while Oregon, the defending champions, dropped to third place with one victory and one defeat.
