The group went on record as desirous of having changes made in the present bus and truck law; they went on record as opposed to the proposed law for fixing the minimum salary for teachers when farmers are denied the right to fix the prices of agricultural products and they also adopted a resolution favoring the selling of revenue bonds for hydro-electric projects.
