U of O Dad Unit Formed in Salem
Dr. Erb, Dr. Barker Speak at First Meeting of Capital Chapter

Organization of a Salem unit of the University of Oregon Dads club, to be known as Capital chapter, was effected Tuesday night at a dinner at the Marion hotel attended by 68 local citizens, Dr. Donald M. Erb, president, and Dr. Burt Brown Barker, vice-president, of the university.

The new chapter elected as officers Hugh E. Rosson, president; W. M. Hamilton, vice-president; James H. Nicholson, secretary-treasurer; Dr. D. B. Hill, Judge J. O. Falley, Dr. J. Foreclosure Ruled Out in Note Case
Finding the semblance of fraud in a \$7000 note and mortgage given by the late Paul V. Johnson, Salem merchant, to his mother-in-law, Minnie G. Graham, Circuit Judge L. G. Lewelling ruled Tuesday that Mrs. Graham could not obtain a foreclosure decree against the dowry interest of her daughter, Leona G. Johnson.

Validity of the mortgage was contested by Chris J. Kowitz, executor of the Paul V. Johnson estate and defendant in the action, on the ground that it was given in fraud of creditors.

Judge Lewelling's opinion stated he did "not mean to say there was a fraudulent design on the part of the plaintiff but such is not necessary in cases of this kind where the facts show a fraud upon other creditors."

The court, however, held the plaintiff entitled to judgment against Leona G. Johnson personally on the \$7000 note and against the executor of her husband's estate on four other notes aggregating \$7750, less sums paid back.

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Boesch Case Nearing Finis

Condemnation Trial May Reach Jury by Noon; Argument Closing

Closing argument in the Boesch condemnation trial will be made before Circuit Judge Carl Hendricks here starting at 9:30 o'clock this morning, with possibility the case may reach the jury by noon. The state capitol reconstruction commission is asking that a price of \$10,474 be fixed for the property, 66 by 138 feet in area, located at what was formerly the southeast corner of Summer and Chemeketa streets, while the owners, Arthur and Mary Boesch, are asking for \$13,716.

The commission's closing witnesses yesterday were J. F. Ulrich, C. Y. Johnson and W. G. Krueger, Salem Realty board members, who each appraised the property at \$10,474, and Arthur A. Selander, tax commission appraiser, who said the commission appraised the property at \$9530 in April, 1937.

Five defense witnesses have testified placing value of the property at from \$17,760 to \$19,136.50.
