Waffles Versatile Food For Anytime

To Launder Zippered Garments Use Care

When washing garments with slide fasteners experts say to launder with fastener closed and not to apply pressure on the slide while ironing.

Another laundering hint is found in a booklet on washing wool gloves and mittens and comes in time for winter time use. Wash the wool in lukewarm water and soap already dissolved, to make a rich suds, wash gently in several sudsy waters, rinse well and remove excess moisture by gently kneading in a Turkish towel. Ease into shape, place tissue paper between the colored cuffs or palms and dry flat away from heat or sun. To remove stubborn spots, knead flake or granulated soap in with the fingers, but never rub on cake soap.

Icebox Pies Rich Desserts for Luncheons

These dessert luncheons require rich foods, something that takes time and thought to give the impression of the hostess' cleverness. Because there is only one thing allowed, it is usually a source of more difficulty in choice than if there was a variety to prepare.

Icebox pies should be fattening enough for any group of slightly chubby ladies, for anyone expecting to eat a dessert luncheon and diet simultaneously, just isn't invited.

Two icebox pies are hereby suggested, either is good, both are rich.

CHOCOLATE ICEBOX PIE
CRUST:
24 graham crackers, crushed
6 tablespoons cold butter
1 cup nuts, rolled with cracker
Blend together with finger tips. Press hard on bottom and sides of pie pan saving one-third of mixture to sprinkle on top.

FILLING:
3 squares unwaxed chocolate
1/4 cup hot water
1 cup confectioner's sugar
1/2 cup sugar
1 cup butter
Stir chocolate with sugar and water over fire until it makes a smooth syrup. Add gradually to beaten yolks and set over hot water, stirring hard until thick, cool. Cream butter and confectioner's sugar, blend with cooked mixture, and fold in stiffly beaten whites. Pour into graham cracker crust, sprinkle with reserved mixture, and decorate with fresh strawberries.

PINEAPPLE ICEBOX PIE
Split a layer of sponge cake, place one layer in bottom of layer pan and spread half of icebox mixture over it. Place other layer of cake over this, then spread rest of mixture on top. Chill in icebox or refrigerator until firm.

FILLING:
1/2 cup sugar
1 cup butter
1/2 cup pineapple juice
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
4 eggs
2 cups confectioner's sugar
1 cup fresh pineapple, chopped and well drained

Put fresh pineapple through food chopper and squeeze very dry. Melt sugar in pineapple juice heating in double boiler to scalding. Add to beaten yolks gradually, stirring well. Pour back in double boiler and cook until thick
