

WPA Project Begins 30th

2500 Feet Wood Pipe Will Be Laid and Other Work Done

SILVERTON—The new WPA project for the Silverton water commission will begin January 30. This is known as the Abiqua project and will consist of the rebuilding of settling and screening box and the relaying of 2500 feet of 16-inch creosoted wood pipes.

If sufficient labor money is left when this is completed approximately 1500 feet of 14-inch pipe will be laid.

The project calls for \$6780 of federal funds and \$4832 of local, totaling \$11,612. Approximately 30 men will be employed at the beginning. Most of these will be local men, coming off road crews and other projects which are being completed.

T. Blust will have direct supervision of the men on the Abiqua. The project is being carried on through the local water department of which Elgin McCleary is superintendent. The commission members who planned the project are Dr. A. W. Simmons, chairman, Roy Morley and Austin Eastman.

Emergency Crop, Feed Loans Asked

Applications for emergency crop and feed loans for 1939 are now being received at Eugene by V. N. Freeman, field supervisor of the emergency crop and feed loan section of the farm credit administration.

The loans will be made, as in the past, only to farmers whose cash requirements are small and who cannot obtain credit from any other source. The money loaned will be limited to the farmer's immediate and actual cash needs for growing his 1939 crops or for the purchase of feed for livestock.

Farmers who can obtain the funds they need from an individual, production credit association, bank, or other concern are not eligible for these crop and feed loans.

As in the past, farmers who obtain emergency crop and feed loans will give a security a first lien on the crop financed, or a first lien on the livestock to be fed if the money borrowed is to be used to produce or purchase feed for livestock.

Application forms and full particulars may be obtained from the office of the county agent.

Warn Hop Growers Of Loan Deadline

Warning to hop growers that this is the last week for the completion of papers to obtain advances on the 1938 crop of hops was issued yesterday by F. J. Newhouse, secretary-manager of the Pacific Coast Hop Stabilization Corporation.

"All papers must be in the hands of the Commodity Credit Corporation in Portland by January 31," Newhouse said, "and the Stabilization Corporation cannot accept responsibility if papers are not completed in its hands in proper form during this week for submission before the time limit expires."

Applications for advances on over 40,000 bales of hops in Oregon, Washington and California have been received by the Corporation, he said. Practically all have been completed and funds advanced to the growers but a few have yet to sign marketing agreements entitling them to the advances.

Newhouse declared that Commodity Credit Corporation cannot extend the time for competing the loans and some of the growers not yet signed may lose their opportunity to obtain advances unless they act at once.
