

Civil Service Law Is Asked

Commission of Three Is Provided by Measure Before Senate

A civil service system covering state employment is provided in a bill introduced in the senate Friday by Senators Thomas R. Mahoney and Representatives Frank Lonerger and Jack R. Caulfield.

A state civil service commission of three members would be created for administration of the law. Members of the commission would be appointed by the governor.

Exemptions under the bill include elective and administrative officials, higher education, penal and correctional institutions, attorney general's assistants, unskilled labor, state police and others.

The senate passed 15 bills and adjourned shortly after noon until 11 a. m. Monday. Thirteen new bills were received of which number eight were introduced by the joint agricultural committee of the senate and house. The latter bills have to do with reorganization of the state's agricultural laws.

Wallace Bill Returned Senator Lew Wallace's bill increasing the cost of non-resident fishing licenses from \$3 to \$5 was re-referred to the game committee following a half-hour debate. Wallace said the state of Washington already charged \$5 for non-resident fishing licenses and there was no reason why Oregon should not impose a similar fee.

"The people of Deschutes county are very much opposed to this bill," Senator U. S. Balentine declared, "and fear that its approval would reduce the tourist travel in that part of the state." Balentine said the non-resident fishing license fee in California was only \$3.

Senator Isaac E. Staples said the state game commission was asking for approximately \$750,000 for the current biennium, and there was no justification for increasing the cost of a non-resident fishing license.

"The more money the game commission receives the more it will spend," Senator Staples said.

The senate defeated another bill introduced by Senator Wallace relating to flashlight hunting for deer.

Senator H. C. Wheeler said this bill was too drastic and would prevent a person from killing a mouse at night, provided he turned on an electric light.

"Too Many Bills" "We have received too many bills of this sort," Senator Wheeler declared, "and I do not intend that they shall be rammed down my throat."

Senator Wallace denied that he had attempted to railroad any bills through the senate as charged by Senator Wheeler.

The bill also was opposed by Senators Balentine and Lyman Ross, Washington county.

Approval was given a bill by Senator Harry Kenin authorizing gasoline tax refunds for 23 special delivery mail carriers in Oregon. Twenty-six of these carriers are employed in Portland and two in Salem. Senator Kenin said these tax refunds would not exceed \$150 a month.

Any school district in Oregon would be permitted to set up an adult education program provided it paid the costs, under a new Senate bill. The city of Portland already has this plan.

When the senate adjourned Friday for the weekend it had received a total of 177 bills.

More than half of these originated with the joint agricultural committee of the senate and house.

Frats Ask no Tax on House Payrolls

EUGENE, Jan. 27.—(AP)—University of Oregon fraternity house managers filed a petition yesterday with the state unemployment compensation commission, seeking exemption from unemployment insurance payments and wages of students working in the living establishments.

In their petition, the managers said services performed by student workers should be classed with those of religious, charitable, scientific, literary, and educational organizations, who are exempt.

Pioneer Figure's Daughter Called

PORTLAND, Jan. 27.—(AP)—A daughter of one of Oregon's colorful pioneer characters, Hattie Boyd, 73, died yesterday at her Newberg home. She was the daughter of Captain A. B. Stuart, Wells Fargo pony express rider and operator of Stuart's pony express in Oregon around 1850.

Mrs. Boyd was the widow of Harry F. Boyd. Surviving are two daughters, a sister and four brothers, all of Portland.

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House Hopper Gets 38 Bills

Monday Noon Is Deadline for Getting in House Legislation

With but one day remaining for the introduction of run of the mill legislation the house yesterday tossed 38 new bills into the law-making machinery and then, despite Speaker R. R. Fattland's hopes for a Saturday adjournment, called it a week.

The house will meet again Monday at 10:30 o'clock with another record batch of bills expected then. Monday noon has been set as the deadline for the introduction of all but emergency legislation.

Among bills introduced was the League of Oregon Cities bill which seeks \$850,000 a year in highway revenues for maintenance of city streets. The bill bore the names of Reps. W. H. Miller (D-Grant Pass), Hector Macpherson (R-Albany), Earl E. Fisher (R-Beaverton), J. F. Hosch (Ind-Bend), Fred W. Herman (R-Rainier) and Lyle D. Thomas (R-West Salem) and Sens. Lyman Ross (D-Albany), Joel C. Booth (R-Lebanon) and Harry M. Kenin (R-Portland).

"No a Diversion" "This bill," Miller said, "is not a diversion measure. Its purpose is to obtain for the cities their just share of highway revenues to be used for maintenance and construction of city streets. The bill asks for only six per cent of the amount cities contribute to the highway fund, and we don't think that is too much to ask."

Among house bills were measures providing that no bank, corporation or trust company may act as administrator or executor of an estate, and a companion bill under which only private individuals could be administrators or executors. The measures appeared almost assured of passage, since 28 representatives and 14 senators sponsored them, just short of a majority of both houses.

The tax conservation bill, providing for county boards to divide levies of counties and their subdivisions, was introduced in the house.

A retirement system for judges who have served ten years and reached the age of 70 is provided in one of the measures introduced yesterday. The retired judges would receive two-thirds pay.

Another measure would increase the salary of the labor commissioner from \$3600 to \$5000 a year.

Other bills would permit a child under 15 to enter school in the preceding September, permit schools to charge rental for use of their gymnasiums, eliminate the charge against counties for putting out forest fires and give the state board of barber examiners power to fix minimum prices.

The house passed and sent to the senate a bill eliminating hospitals and public health expenditures from operation of the five per cent bond limitation.

Rep. W. W. Kimberling (R-Prineville) introduced a bill which would have a hospital but found it would be necessary to go over the limitation.

Four minor senate bills were passed in the house.

Senators Steiwer, McKay, Zurcher—Provides for supervision and control of tax levying bonds by a supervision commission appointed by the governor.

HB 141, by Hall and 27 other house members; Ballentine and 13 other senate members—Provides that banks and trust companies shall not act as administrators or executors. Amends section 11-231, 1935 Supplement.

HB 142, by Hall and 27 other house members; Ballentine and 13 other senate members—Provides that banks and trust companies shall not act as administrators or executors. Amends section 11-231, 1935 Supplement.

HB 143, by Hall and 27 other house members; Ballentine and 13 other senate members—Provides that banks and trust companies shall not act as administrators or executors. Amends section 11-231, 1935 Supplement.

HB 144, by Newby, McKenna, Smith, Riddle and Senator Steiwer—Amends section 55-1243, 1935 Supplement, as amended. Provides that a farmer's truck used exclusively in transporting farm products and wood originating on his own premises shall be exempt under this section.

HB 145, by Snyder—Amends section 20-2217, 1935 Supplement. Relates to dog licenses. Provides particularly that no dog license fee be required from blind persons using such dog as a guide.

HB 146, by Hall and 27 other house members; Ballentine and 13 other senate members—Amends section 22-1213, Oregon Code. Relates to trust organizations. Eliminates the provision that such trust organizations may be appointed administrators and executors.

HB 147, by French and Senator Ellis—Amends section 31-113, 1935 Supplement. Relates to salaries of district attorneys, judges, and other officials.

HB 148, by Miller and Heinemann—Amends section 36-104, Oregon Code. Increases the hours of county clerks for registration of electors in some instances.

HB 149, by Snyder—Provides for compensation for injury to livestock, poultry and other personal property caused by dogs. Repeals sections 20-2302, 20-2307, 20-2308, 20-2319 and 20-2320, Oregon Code 1930.

HB 150, by Greenwood and Heinemann—Amends section 35-113, 1935 Supplement. Relates to salmon fishing in the Rogue river.

HB 151, by Hosch and Snyder—Amends section 27-3301 and 27-3302. Provides for licensing public exhibitions outside of municipalities.

HB 152, by committee on insurance—Amends a number of various sections relating to the state fire marshal. The purpose appears to be to increase the authority of the fire marshal.

HB 153, by committee on insurance—Amends section 46-2008, 46-2010 and 46-2013, Oregon Code, and declares an emergency. The effect appears to increase the requirements for garage buildings. Relates to the office of fire marshal.

HB 154, by Farrell, Hall, Chapman, Riddle, Hilton, Lonerger, Furrer, Hill, Pier, McKenna and
