Rotenone Favored
Worthwhile instruction on small fruits, mostly strawberries, was given at the meeting this week at IOOF hall under direction of Lloyd Mullen, county agent; approximately 60 growers were told that one-half of 1 percent of rotenone was effective in destroying the spittlebug, worst menace to small fruits.

Spring fertilization was declared less effective and less economical than building soil fertility by plowing under a cover crop a year before planting. D. W. Edwards and O. T. McWhorter of OSC were the main speakers.

Mr. and Mrs. Conrad Falk left Thursday night for several weeks' trip, visiting their son Phillips and family at San Bernardino, Calif.

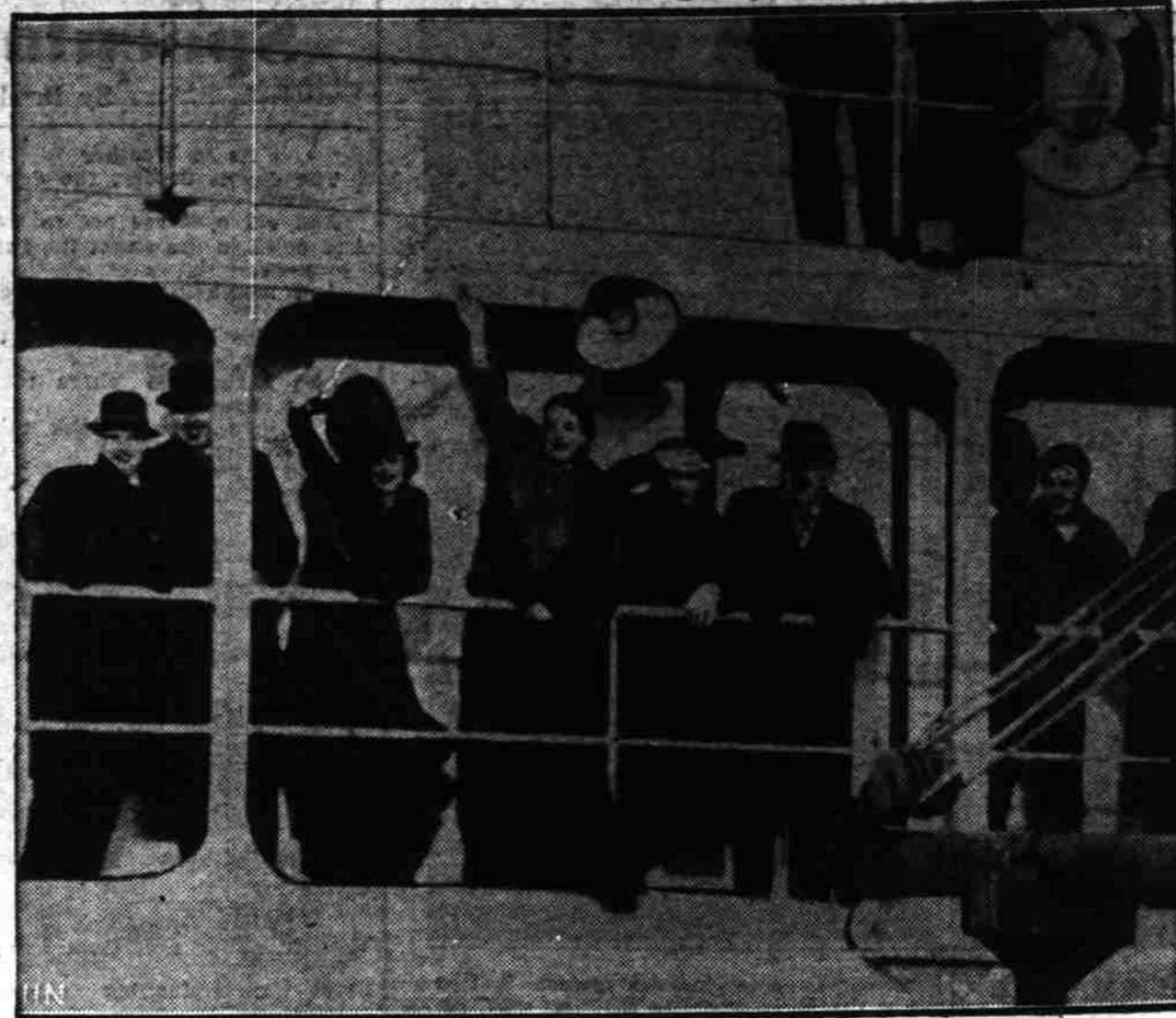
Fennimore Hurt By Log in Woods
