

Co-op Hears 1938 Reports

Mt. Angel Creamery Makes Substantial Gain in Operations

MT. ANGEL—The annual report of the Mt. Angel Cooperative creamery, read at the annual business meeting of the members Monday showed an increase of 420,000 pounds over last year in the amount of butter manufactured. The total butter manufactured amounted to 2,463,642 pounds.

A remarkable advance was made by the creamery in all lines during the past year, President R. J. Berning reported. The membership reached 2216, which is 533 more members than a year ago. A still greater increase by extending the territory into the Corvallis district was discussed at the meeting and a motion was carried to refer the matter to the judgment of the board of directors. The board was likewise empowered to install more refrigerator lockers if they deemed fit. A new milk dryer was ordered and a 11,000 pound capacity separator purchased to take care of the extra business.

Last year the creamery added Lebanon and Albany to its territory.

High Grade Maintained
The total sales and income for the year amounted to \$776,239.40. Of this, \$218,015.40 was paid in milk and cream, 1,886,461.36 pounds or 98.55 per cent was No. 1 butterfat, 28,904.99 pounds or 1.43 per cent was No. 2 butterfat, and a mere 279.3 pounds or .01 per cent was No. 3 butterfat.

Besides the butter and ice cream manufactured, the creamery made 1,691,896 pounds of milk powder.

Ed Overlund and C. E. Jorgensen were unanimously reelected directors at the meeting, and the board of directors renamed R. J. Berning and Jos. Bernat as president and vice president.

From 350 to 400 members were present at the general meeting which began at 10:30 and continued into the afternoon, with time out for lunch. The latter was served in the basement dining hall of St. Mary's school and was free to creamery members.

All but One Store in Small Highway Town Lost in Early Blaze

Largest loss suffered by the A. B. Horner general merchandise store, the proprietor also losing a new car and garage. The postoffice and dwelling and the two-story Odd Fellows hall were also total losses.

Residents could do nothing, as Gates has no fire fighting equipment and help from Mill City could not be summoned as the telephone lines were cut.

First persons believed to have noticed the fire were the Ned Richards family, who heard gunshot explosions in the Horner store. The Richards' living quarters are in connection with their pool hall, located at a distance from the other business houses.
