

The Portland Art museum has recognized the high quality of teaching for children in our Art Center by devoting one gallery for the next two weeks to an exhibition of 25 selected paintings by local children. This is the same group that was previously shown at Reed college.

Classes in weaving, much in demand since the Center opened, are being arranged.
