Dividends End

\$16,531 Payment Allotted as Final Dividend of Defunct Institution

Payment of final dividends to depositors in the defunct Bank of Stayton was authorized by Circuit Judge L. G. Lewelling yesterday. Final dividend to commercial depositors will amount to 7.72 per cent, or \$16,531.59, making a total received by them of \$2.72 per cent of the \$214,139.79 in ordinary claims.

Savings depositors will receive a 6.79 per cent, or \$3324.70 final dividend, for a total of 81.79 per cent of the \$122,809 in claims filed in this department.

The judge also authorized the superintendent of banks to retain the \$527.51 balance, after payment of the dividends, to pay expenses of closing the liquidation proceedings.

10 Salem Men Appointed Named for 1939 Work in two Counties
The war department this week notified ten Salem reserve officers of their selection as examiners for appointment and promotion boards that may be convened in the Marion and Polk county area during 1939.

Officers receiving the appointments were Major Miller B. Hayden, judge advocate general department; Capt. Edgar R. Austin and Capt. Norman K. Raymond, infantry; Capt. Emmett C. Forsythe, chemical warfare; Capt. Louis B. Schoel, dental department; Capt. Vern W. Miller, medical department; Capt. George Spaur and Lieut. T. T. McKenzie, engineers; Lieut. Kenneth W. Dalton, quartermaster corps, and Lieut. Floyd L. Siegmund, field artillery.

The order directs the assignment of one or more of the examiners for all boards called for applicants for appointment in the officers reserve corps and for all officers applying for promotion within the corps.

Sixteen directors were elected by the Salem Community Chest at its annual meeting Friday noon. A financial report showed \$39,847.87 collected during the year, subscriptions of \$47,306. Total, \$13,369.61 has been distributed to the participating agencies. Operation and campaign expenses amounted to \$2320.06.

As compared to \$2 per cent of the 1937 budget subscribed, 103 per cent of the 1938 minimum budget was paid in or pledged. Collections in 1937 pledged amounted to 98.3 per cent. A vote of appreciation was accorded to William Moran, secretary, for his work in connection with collections and clerical details.

Hamilton Favored
Following election of directors, a unanimous vote supported a motion favoring reelection of William M. Hamilton as president. This choice rests with the board of directors. Newly elected directors are:

Representatives of the participating agencies, in brief talks at the close of the meeting, said the principal benefit of community chest to them was the opportunity it afforded for concentrating on the services they perform, being relieved of the task of financing the program. It was also stated that cooperation between agencies had been improved through the council of social agencies.

Plans for Youth Center Progress
Plans for development of the Youth Center in the former city camp grounds were advanced at a meeting of the NYA council at the Salem chamber of commerce rooms Thursday. Work of renovating the building was expected to begin February 16, with six or eight boys employed. Construction of furniture, similar to that in Timberline lodge, was to be carried on in the NYA workshops.

The council went on record favoring action by the city in rippaving Shelton ditch through the property, and improvement of the grounds under a WPA project.

Artillery Officer Hits Supine Peace
"Peace at any price" is an alluring but deceptive slogan, Harrison Elgin, coast artillery reserve corps officer, told the YMCA Breakfast club yesterday morning. "Certainly," he said, "no price that does not exact the sacrifice of national honor or national security is too high to pay for peace with security."

Elgin said he was impressed with a recent article, which he termed misleading, in which the staggering cost of the nation's preparation for war was deplored. He declared such misrepresentation is insidious and, unless counteracted by truth, will in time tend to warp the viewpoint of those who evaluate arguments by their loudness rather than by logic.
