Mozart Boys' Choir Will Sing Here

With the appearance of the Mozart Boys' choir of Vienna on Tuesday, March 7, the Salem Community Concert association will have completed their second season bringing well known artists to Salem.

The Mozart Boys' choir of twenty voices from the Haydn Basilica of the Church of the Virgin in Vienna, arrived in the United States last December to begin their first transcontinental tour which will include approximately sixty concerts in this country. Last year the choir was on tour throughout the British Isles, Canada, Mexico and South America. Its first appearance in this country was in January, 1938. After leaving the west coast the choir will go to Hawaii, New Zealand, Australia, and back to Vienna. Traveling with them is a nurse who supervises their diet, a choir mother and a school teacher.

The choristers, whose ages range from 8 to 15 years, are trained in Vienna by Dr. George Gruber, a Viennese in birth and training. Since 1928, when he graduated from the State Academy of Music in Vienna, he has conducted the Vienna Choir boys, the Vienna Central choir and has directed orchestral concerts in South America and Mexico. He assumed the conductorship of the Mozart Boys choir in 1937.

The Mozart Boys choir is not to be confused with another organization, the Vienna Choir boys (Wiener Sängerknaben), which is from the Hofburg Chapel, and which appeared in Oregon last year.
