Parbeil sweet potatoes, cut in thin slices and arrange in layers in a casserole with cooked ham, baking until well heated through. Or cut the uncooked sweet potatoes in lengthwise pieces, put incasserole with raw ham and bake in a medium even until mest and potatoes are done. May add some liquid, stock or water, or cover easserole for part of cook-


