From here on out, including this Friday's face-off with Gill's rampaging Orangemen, the Ducks must produce or else that coast championship playoff won't be staged in the McArthur lido after all. After other losses to the Beavers and Oregon would go into the Washington series tied up with the Huskies, provident Idaho drops both games to Washington.

It begins tonight! Meaning, of course, the annual Whitman-Willamette basketball series. And, as usual, the circuit championship depends to a large extent on the outcome of this two-game tussle between Nig Borleske's mighty mites from eastern Washington and Happy Howard Maple's mid-Willamette valley Bearcats.

Northerners Trail Bearcats

Whitman enters the series with one more win and one more loss than Willamette, the Missionaries having won 10 and lost 2 to the Methodists' 9 wins and 1 loss. A series sweep by Whitman would give Mr. Borleske another Northwest conference flag; a split of the double-counter series would make it necessary for the Bearcats to win their two remaining games with Pacific to cop the title; and a series sweep by Willamette would place the Bearcats in a position where only one win from Pacific would be necessary to insure the championship.

Tiny Quiver Is Fast

Glen Bullock, last year's conference scoring champ with 113 points, is again leading the Whitman scorers and has his eye on the '39 title. He is sided at forward by Larry Pepin, one of the Peplin twins of the club, who is not far behind Bullock in the scoring column. Arno Gentry, captain, is the club's fiery little pivoter, while Paul Webb and Hal Heidenreich, both veterans, work at the guards.

Maple will start his regular quint that has hung up 19 wins in 23 starts for the season, including 9 of 10 conference battles. It will feature the high scoring "Wild Bill" Anton in the keyhole slot, sided by smooth working Howard Eberly and aggressive Bob White at the forwards, and with Otto "Scouter" Skopli and Cecil Quesseth working the back court.

A preliminary, at 7 o'clock, will feature the Bearkittens against the city league Papermakers.
