

Better Breeding Of Cattle Urged

Larger Returns Possible if More Attention Paid to Improvement

SCIO — "No matter how well you feed a cow, she can produce only the amount of milk which she is inherently capable of producing," R. W. Morse, extension dairy husbandman at Oregon State college, told a large group of Scio dairymen at a meeting at VFW hall recently.

Larger returns would be netted to dairymen if more attention were paid to breeding of dairy stock, Morse contended, and urged the use of purebred herd sires of known ancestry as a profitable practice. The speaker stated that use of scrub bulls resulted in culling of about two thirds of the daughters because of low production.

F. M. Brandt, head of the di-

vision of animal industries at the college, discussed feeding and management of dairy cows.

Linn County Agent Floyd Muller arranged the meeting in collaboration with the state college experts and with O. E. Mikesell, county 4-H club leader. Mikesell urged that all dairymen who have not signed on the Bangs disease program do so at an early date, as the present federal program will be changed on May 1 this year.
